
Watermelon Seed Flickin'

CLASSES:

Pre Junior 6 years & under; Junior 7–9 years; Pre Intermediate 10–13 years; Intermediate 14–18 years; adult 19 & older.

RULES:

Decorate potato or veggies with only organic items; other vegetables, fruits and grains (fresh or dried). Do not use candy, paper, paints, crayons, store bought materials, fabric or commercially processed foods etc. You may use toothpicks to keep your project together. They are not to be part of the decoration.



The Fair and Ontario Saturday Market are not responsible for any decorations— entries must be picked up at end of fair as stated in the fair book, or will be disposed of.

4-H is designed to develop the youth of Oregon into productive adult citizens. 4-H uses a non-formal education process of engaging youth in an "learning by doing" approach. 

2023 MALHEUR COUNTY FAIR General Rules



The general supervision of the grounds and entire exhibition, the police regulations and entrance gates are vested in the Malheur County Fair Board. The Fair Association reserves to its Board of Directors the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, and to add to and amend these rules as they deem advisable.

- 1. No Entry Clerk shall, under any circumstances, allow the entry books of the association to go from his possession, or to be inspected by anyone except the officers or appointees of the association, nor shall any entry be made known by the clerk until the entries are closed and the entry books placed at the hands of the Superintendent of the proper department. Any exhibitor found examining the entry books will forfeit all premiums or money won.
- 2. Exhibits shipped to the Fair should be addressed in care of the Malheur County Fair Board, 795 N.W. 9th St., Ontario, OR 97914. They must be sent prepaid as the association will not be liable for express or freight charges. In every instance, exhibits must be brought at the risk of the exhibitor or owner.
- **3.** Open class livestock exhibits must have been owned by exhibitors at least two weeks prior to the Fair and land products must have been grown or produced by the exhibitor.
- 4. All livestock entries must be entered for competition in the name of the bonafide owner. Animal's registration number must be entered on the entry card. Persons trying to deceive the committee in regard to ownership of animals, or who shall purchase or borrow and then exhibit them as their own raising shall forfeit all claims to premiums. Registration ear tags must match registration papers and will be checked by the Superintendent.
- **5.** The Association will take reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of exhibits sent to the exhibition, but the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them. Should any exhibit or portion thereof

- be injured, burned, lost, or stolen, the association will give assistance towards recovery of the same but will not be liable to make payment for the value thereof.
- **6.** Exhibitors of animals, machinery in motion and other exhibits liable to occasional accidents, injury or damage to persons coming in contact with them shall guard their exhibits and protect the public coming in contact therewith. Every exhibitor, by exhibiting during the Fair, agrees that he will indemnify the Association from and against any claim or demand, cost, charges and expenses which the Association may incur, suffer or be put to by reason of any accident or any person being injured or suffering damage through or by reason of such exhibit not being properly guarded or the public not being protected therefrom. That he will, upon demand, reimburse the Fair Association for any such sums it may have been compelled to expend by reason of such claims, expenses or charges.
- 7. If any exhibit is entered in the wrong class, an effort to correct the mistake will be made, providing it is discovered before the awards are made. Where an error has been made by clerks or the judges, the same shall be settled by the Malheur County Fair Board upon satisfactory proof that such error was made.
- **8.** In all cases the right is reserved to reject or accept conditionally, any entry or application at any time at the discretion of the Board.
- **9.** Exhibits must not be removed before Sunday, August 6, 2023.
- 10. At the close of Fair the exhibitors must remove the exhibit as early as possible. Animal exhibitors must remove all bedding from the pens or stall, used by them, and place the bedding in areas designated by Fair Management. Any article left in the building or on the grounds after the close of the exhibition will be at the risk of the owner, and will become property of the Fair Board after thirty days.
- **11.** All entries must be entered and released in accordance with the rules in

- their respective divisions. Check Schedule of Events for entry & release time for all exhibits.
- 12. Fair officially opens at 2 p.m. Tuesday, August 1, 2023. Ticket gates open at 2 p.m. Tuesday, August 1, 2023 and at 8 a.m. daily Wednesday, August 2 through Saturday, August 5, 2023. Commercial Building opens at 2 p.m. Tuesday, August 1, 2023 and 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Wednesday, August 2, 2023 through Saturday, August 5, 2023. Red Barn opens 4-10 p.m. Tuesday, August 1, and 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Wednesday, August 2 through Saturday, August 5, 2023.
- 13. No bikes, skateboards, scooters, or motorcycles are allowed around on the grounds. Horses are to be kept in Grandstand area only. No dogs or domestic pets allowed on fairgrounds other than show exhibitors.
- 14. Cars parked in unauthorized areas and fire lanes will be towed away at the owner's expense.
- **15.** No illegal drugs will be allowed on the Fairgrounds.
- 16. All alcoholic beverages on the grounds are to be in designated areas. Minors in possession will be charged on the Fairgrounds by Ontario City Police and/or Malheur County Sheriff. In addition, any exhibitor who is a minor found in possession of or under the influence of alcohol or drugs, or caught vandalizing, the Ontario City Police and/or Malheur County Sheriff will be notified and will be subject to immediate expulsion from the fair. If said exhibitor is a 4-H or FFA member who will be selling an animal at the market sale, no premium money will be awarded nor the sale of the animal allowed.
- 17. All gates will be closed at midnight. Exhibitors extremely late to their tents or campers after curfew without prior approval from the adult responsible and security will be reported to the grievance committee. All campers will be in their camping area and quiet by curfew.
- **18.** Any premiums not picked up from the Fair Office by Sept 1, 2023, will be forfeited and returned to the Fair.

19. All animals to be placed in competition at the Malheur County Fair must be pre-registered to insure stall space. Livestock entry forms are available in the book and at the Fair Office and are due July 7, 2023.

20. Crossover exhibits from 4-H and/or FFA to Open Class will not be allowed.

21. It is understood that the act of entering an exhibit or contest at the Malheur County Fair is asking the Fair Management to secure a qualified judge to place a judgment on the exhibit or performance. It is therefore courteous to gracefully accept the decision of the judge realizing that it may be in conflict with your set of standards. Every reasonable effort will be made to secure highly qualified and conscientious judges. If you feel you are not willing to accept this judgment, please write "exhibit only" on your entry. The decision of the judge is final. Any concerns must be directed to the Superintendent of the Division.

VEHICLE and FOOT TRAFFIC INFORMATION

Fire lanes must be maintained throughout the grounds, throughout Fair.

The Archway Gate into the Fairgrounds will be closed to all vehicles Monday after 7 p.m. through Saturday of Fair week. This is also a safety measure for foot traffic. There are two other entrances for vehicles into the grounds. The South Gate gives access to the south half of the facility and the parking lot west of the livestock barns and is to be used for admittance of livestock exhibitors only. The West Gate, off Park Avenue, gives access to the Horse Barns. Daily deliveries inside the Fairgrounds must be made before 9 a.m. through the West gate only.

Fair Board and Fair Board Designees are the only individuals that are permitted to use an ATV on the fairgrounds during the open hours.

EXHIBITORS:

Trucks and/or horse trailers are to be parked at the NE corner of the facility, unless otherwise posted.

Trucks and/or horse trailers are not permitted in the camping area.

OVERNIGHT CAMPING

All campers are required to purchase a camping permit. Tent camping is \$30 per

week. Dry RV camping is \$60 per week. RV's with electricity is \$120 per week. Only 1 vehicle per Camping space will be permitted. This vehicle must have a "Camper's Parking Pass" prominently displayed.

Each camper will register at the Fair Office and turn in written parental permission, the name of the adult in charge of the tent or camper and list of the occupants, and display a registration card of each occupant in a visible place designated by the Fair Board.

One adult shall be responsible for each tent or camper. All campers are required to register and display a registration card. All campers will be in their camping area and quiet by curfew. The Fair Board appreciates the cooperation of everyone in keeping the grounds safe and orderly. If there are campers that cannot afford the camping fees, please let the fair office know and arrangements will be made.

PAYMENT OF AWARDS

Fabric ribbons will be given (at time of judging) in some Fair divisions. Other divisions will have placing stickers attached to the entry tags and fabric ribbons will be given with premium money.

In Open Class Departments:

Blue: First place, \$3 **Red:** Second place, \$2 **White:** Third place, \$1

Special awards are listed in each division.

Exhibitors are limited to one entry per section for judging:

Judges will determine entry quality. 4-H, FFA and Open Class Departments included.

All awards for which cash prizes are awarded will be paid by cash or check.

4-H premiums will be available at the 4-H office. FFA premiums will be handed out by the FFA Advisors. Open class premiums can be obtained on Friday, August 4, 2023 from 12 noon - 4 pm in the Fair office.

Release time for exhibits:

8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Sunday, August 6, 2023 All decisions by the judges hired are final.

The Malheur County Fair is an open show and exhibitors out of the county and state are welcome to enter in all open classes. If funds are available, payment of premiums will be made in full amounts as listed; however, the Fair Board reserves the right to prorate premium money in the event there are insufficient funds to pay the full premiums awarded by the judges.

MALHEUR COUNTY FAIR BOARD ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY

The Malheur County Fair Board will maintain compliance with all applicable federal, state and local environmental laws, ordinances and regulations. The Policy of the Fair Board is to adhere to the Oregon State Department of Agriculture regulations pertaining to agriculture and environmental concerns.

To prevent the transmission of enteric pathogens and other transmittable diseases including E.coli, the Malheur County Fair Board will ask fairgoers to wash their hands immediately upon leaving the barns.

Food and beverage is discouraged in the barns. The Fair board will have hand washing stations near the barns. There will be signs reminding fairgoers to wash their hands and not eat food in the barns.

ITEMS PROHIBITED ON FAIRGROUNDS

The following items are prohibited on the property owned or controlled ("Fairgrounds") by the Malheur County Fair Board, unless specifically authorized by the Board:

- **a.** Bicycles, skateboards, roller blades, scooters: unlocked heelies;
 - **b.** Unauthorized vehicles:
- **c.** Unauthorized animals, reptiles, insects, arachnids, and other pets;
 - **d.** Weapons;
- **e.** Fireworks, explosives or explosive devices, and inflammables;
- **f.** Alcohol or alcoholic beverages outside of designated areas:
- **g.** Attire, costume, clothing or accessories in which, based on the training and experience of a law enforcement officer or the Director, can be articulated as being affiliated with an established criminal gang;
 - **h.** Controlled substances;
- i. Any other object or objects which in the opinion of the Fair Board Director or his/her designee may affect the safety and well-being of persons attending events at the fairgrounds.

EXHIBITOR'S SCHEDULE—OPEN, 4-H and FFA DEPARTMENTS

LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS



ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS: 4-H, FFA, OPEN

All animals and poultry will be given a clinical examination by a veterinarian on arrival to the fairgrounds. No animal from a quarantined herd will be admitted. All animals are subject to examination from veterinarian at any time on the fairgrounds. No animal will be admitted or allowed to stay that shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease, or any unsightly condition (such as ringworm, pink eye, sore mouth or malnutrition). Fair management reserves the right to require health inspections, diagnostic tests, treatments and/or other animal health measures or procedures which might become necessary in emergencies.

All poultry will be blood tested for Pullorum Typhoid disease by Oregon Department of Ag officials.

All sheep will have a Scrapie tag from the USDA.

All Goats will have a registration tattoo or a Scrapie tag from the USDA.

All heifer cattle older than 4 months of age must be brucellosis vaccinated with an official ID and tattoo present.

MEDICATION AND CHEMICAL RESIDUE AVOIDANCE

The Malheur County Fair Board is concerned that all meat and milk products marketed from fair animals be free from illegal and unethical drugs and chemicals. The following rules are adopted to prevent drug residues and pertain to all livestock, horses and small animals exhibited at the Fair.

- 1. No drug, chemical, or feed additive shall be administered to any animal on the Fairgrounds during the Malheur County Fair without the approval of the Fair Manager, Fair Veterinarian or a person designated by the manager. Administration of drugs or chemicals requires that the exhibitor file a "Drug Administration Form" with the Fair office. Administration of any drugs or chemicals on the fairgrounds must be witnessed by the superintendent of the division or the Fair Veterinarian.
- **2.** All market animals and producing dairy animal exhibitors and their parent/guardian are required to sign a disclosure statement on the official health form disclosing all drugs, chemicals and feed additives used in or on the animal for the entire feeding period.
- 3. All market animals must meet all withdrawal requirements to enter the sale. Market animals shall not contain any identifiable or unidentifiable foreign substance including: drugs, steroids, herbs, or chemicals; greater than those allowed by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for the sale of consumption as human food during the time the animal is on the fairgrounds. Test samples collected from 4-H and FFA animals shall be free of any foreign substance, including but not limited to steroids, drugs or chemicals affecting the central nervous system (for example: stimulants, depressants or painkillers).
- **4.** All exhibitors (open, 4-H and FFA) must complete an official health form for each animal exhibited. Exhibitor and parent/guardian (if exhibitor is under the age of 18) must sign an agreement to permit animals to be tested for drugs, chemicals and feed additives.

- 5. The Malheur County Fair Board reserves the right to test any animal exhibit for tampering, altering, misrepresentation, unethical fitting, natural or foreign substance, to include drugs, blood, oil, steroids, or chemicals. The submission of any 4-H, open class or FFA entry into the Malheur County Fair expressly grants the Fair Board the right to conduct such tests. Such tests may include laboratory analysis of saliva, urine, blood or other substances. Refusing tests will result in disqualification, forfeiture of awards and possibly expulsion.
- **6.** Violations of the above rules will result in disqualification and forfeiture of any awards, and may result in expulsion from the fairgrounds and violator ineligibility to participate in the animal divisions in future fairs.
- **7.** Fees associated with the examination and treatment of any animal at the fair, by the fair veterinarian, are the responsibility of the animal's owner. Payment is required at the time of service. The Fair Board is not responsible for fees generated on sick animals. The fair veterinarian will be available at a designated period each day. See the fair office for times. In emergency situations, the fair veterinarian can be contacted through the fair office.

OUT-OF-STATE ORIGIN

All out of state entries to the fairgrounds must have an official certificate of inspection from an accredited veterinarian to present at entry on the grounds. All out of state entry requirements must be met for this certificate of inspection. The current requirements can be found at www.oregon.gov under the animal export and import requirements page.

Cattle

All out of state dairy cattle older than 2 months of age must be tuberculosis tested.

Swine

Proof of vaccination for leptospirosis and erysipelas must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. A statement is also required that pseeudorabies vaccine has not been performed.

Sheep

All sheep will be inspected for any indications of Blue Tongue, Contagious Ecthyma (sore mouth), foot rot, sore sheath or any other contagious or infectious disease. All sheep exhibited will have USDA scrapie eartag.

Goats

All dairy goats over six (6) months of age must be brucellosis tested and negative within thirty (30) days prior to entry into Oregon. All goats will have a USDA flock # and scrapie eartag or registration tattoo

Poultry - Pigeons - Rabbits - Cavies

No animal shall be admitted or allowed to remain on the grounds that shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease or any unsightly condition. Birds or animals should not be vaccinated with live Newcastle disease (Pneumoencephalitis) virus vaccine or any other live virus vaccine within 45 days prior to entry to Fairgrounds. Rabbits will be checked for ear mites before entering.

All poultry, including turkeys, must originate from flocks under supervision of the National Poultry Improvement Plan or the entire flock of origin must be tested and found free of Pullorum-Typhoid disease within the past thirty (30) days preceding entry to Oregon.

Horses

All out of state horses are required to have a current negative Coggins test.



ANIMAL WELFARE POLICY Oregon Fairs Association

The fitting and showing of livestock are traditional hallmarks of Oregon's fair industry as are rodeos and horse racing. Each year, tens of thousands of 4-H and FFA members, as well as adults, actively participate in competitions involving cattle, horses, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens, ducks, geese, llamas, rabbits, hamsters, guinea pigs, dogs and other animals.

Considering the importance of animals to Oregon fairs, it shall be the policy of members of the Oregon Fairs Association to treat all animals at the fair in a humane manner. Animals shall be provided clean bedding, adequate food and water, and fair exhibitors shall keep their animals from harm. It shall further be the policy of OFA members to protect animals from mistreatment by the general public and to assure the safety of fair patrons. Persons in charge of fair activities involving animals shall be made aware of this policy. (OFA 10/88)

MALHEUR COUNTY FAIR VET

Dr. Angie Allum lives in Vale where she practices and operates Vale Veterinary Clinic. She has a small herd of cattle and ropes in her free time. Dr. Allum has many fond memories of 4-H during her youth where she participated in market beef and many other projects. Fair week is a special event for Dr. Allum during the year.

OPEN CLASS DEPARTMENT



1. Red Barn Exhibits are checked in on Sunday, July 30 from 1-5 pm and/or Monday, July 31 from noon - 7 pm. prior to the beginning of the Malheur County Fair.

Advanced registration is encouraged.

- a. Flowers are checked in on Wednesday, August 2, from 7 am to 9:30 am.
- b. Veggie Critters can be checked in on Monday or can be checked in on Friday just prior to the judging at the Loafing Shed.
- c. Decorated Veggie Critters will then be placed in the Red Barn for display until the end of the fair.
- 2. Exhibits will be released from 8 am to 2 pm on Sunday, August 6, 2023. No exceptions. Ribbons and premiums can be picked up at that time or the following week from 10 am to 4 pm at the fair office.
- **3.** Red Barn Supervisors, Division Superintendents and the Fair Board reserve the right to exclude exhibits.

4. Generally, Exhibitor Classes are defined by age. These Classes are:

ADULT (19+ yrs)

INTERMEDIATE (14–18 yrs)

PRE-INTERMEDIATE (7–13 yrs)

JUNIOR (6 & under)

Every Exhibitor Class does not necessarily exhibit in every division. Some divisions are judged with all competitors equal, some have youth and adult divisions.

The Professional Category in any division does not have an age classification. Professionals are defined as:

Anyone who produces items for sale in shops, does custom work for hire, is an instructor or advertises as a business.

Business cards can be displayed with exhibits **after** the judging is complete.

The Fair Board is not responsible for fees generated on sick animals. The fair veterinarian will be available at a designated period each day. See the fair office for times. In emergency situations, the fair veterinarian can be contacted through the fair office.

GENERAL RULES

1. Pre-registration. In order to ensure adequate stall space, it will be necessary to pre-register all animals on or before July 7. This may be done by mailing the necessary information to the Malheur County Fair Board Office, 795 NW 9th Street, Ontario, OR 97914.

Application for entry into any classes not requiring pedigree must bear date of birth, or age of animal, sex, breed, and ear tag or tattoo number. Animals competing in these classes shall be true to breed type, and if not, may at the discretion of judges, be eliminated from competition.

Any animal arriving at the Fairgrounds that is not pre-registered will be assigned space only in the event that vacant space exists over and above the assigned pre-registered livestock.

Pre-registration: \$5.00 per animal

- **2.** Crossover exhibits will NO LONGER be allowed from 4-H and/ or FFA into the Open Class division.
- 3. Registration Day. Upon arrival at the Fairgrounds, submit health certificate and, in the case of registered animals, registry papers, at the Open Class Office before unloading. A Health Information Form will be provided by exhibitor on each animal and filed with the Fair Office.
- **4.** Straw will be used for bedding material in all livestock barns. Straw will be kept in designated areas on the grounds and exhibitors will be responsible for getting it to the area of use. Exhibitors must furnish own equipment, such as wheelbarrows, pitchforks, etc. Vehicles will not be allowed in livestock area after 9 A.M. each morning. **Sawdust will be used in the swine barn and the small animal barn.**
- **5. Care of Animals.** Each exhibitor will be expected to care for his own animals. If unable to do so, exhibitor must arrange for someone to take care of their animals. Unattended animals may result in disqualification. Stalls must be kept safe and clean at all times.
- **6.** All animals entered must be in place not later than **7 p.m.**, **Tuesday**, **August 1.** Request special dispensation for other times.
- **7.** Animals competing in Get of Sire or Produce of Dam classes need not be the property of a single owner or members of his immediate family.
- 8. The superintendent shall exclude stock from competition, should there be any unnecessary delay on the part of the exhibitor in bringing the stock into the show ring. When on exhibit in ring, each animal must be attended and kept under control at all times. Bulls, 6 months and over, are required to have a ring in the nose and must be shown with staff and other safety equipment. Any animal that seems dangerous may be disqualified.

All competing animals will be exhibited and paraded at the discretion of the Superintendent of that livestock division.

- **9.** No animal shall be decorated with any unnecessary trappings, nor shall any ribbon previously won be placed upon the animal until after the judges have made their award. During the awarding of the premiums, the exhibitors shall remain with their entries, but are in no instance allowed to comment upon the exhibit in question before the judges.
 - 10. Washing of animals must be done on wash rack.
- 11. All livestock exhibitors will remove all bedding material from the stall, cleaned down to the concrete or dirt, before leaving the Fairgrounds. All bedding material is to be placed in designated dump areas.
- **12.** All Beef and Dairy animals will have a neck rope or chain with a lead tied to the manger in addition to a halter. This neck rope or chain shall be used at all times while in the barns.
- 13. All animals being exhibited at the fair must pass a health check by the Fair veterinarian prior to being unloaded and stalled at the fair. These are the established times for vet checks: Monday: Horses—9 a.m. to 11 a.m. Tuesday: Small Animals—7-10 a.m.; Swine—7-10 a.m.; Goats—10 a.m. to 12 p.m.; Dairy—4-7 p.m.; Sheep—10-12 p.m.; Beef—4-7 p.m.; Dogs—TBD.
- **14.** Horses will enter at west gate. ALL other animals will enter through the south gate.
- **15.** Open Class market animals are not allowed to be sold through the Junior Sales Committee Auction.

4-H DEPARTMENT



Positive youth development is the primary goal of the Oregon State University Extension 4-H program. The Malheur County Fair provides experiences designed to contribute to the leadership development and personal growth of 4-H youth. The Fair provides the setting for a showcase of the products, skills, and knowledge of the youth who participate in the 4-H program. Above all, the Fair provides an opportunity to share friendships, become acquainted with others, and have fun.

4-H CLUBS

Rules and Regulations Please read General Rules, under Malheur County Fair. All rules from this section apply to 4-H members

1. 4-H Membership – 4-H members, 9-19 years of age as of September 1st, 2022, are eligible to compete in the 4-H Department. All 4-H members must be enrolled and paid in 4-H by the deadline. All forms must be filed with the Extension Office no later than January 31, 2023, to be eligible to exhibit at the fair in the 4-H department. All 4-H members will be responsible for awareness, understanding and following all rules and guidelines outlined in the 4-H Handbook, 4-H county newsletters, 4-H Club Charter, OSU 4-H Policy Manual, OSU Extension website, and Malheur County Fair Book. The 4-H Member and Volunteer Code of Conduct will be enforced throughout the fair. Any member or volunteer not adhering to the guidelines will be excused from all 4-H events. When participating in 4-H activities, you are representing yourself, your club, your county, and the state 4-H program.

Out of County Participation – All 4-H members exhibiting in Malheur County Fair may only exhibit in Malheur County regardless of the project area. The 4-H member may not exhibit in any other county or state. For 4-H members who reside in a county or state other than Malheur County, the member is required to complete the MOU and receive approval from Malheur County and the county they reside in before enrollment will be accepted.

- 2. Novice members Novice is to be defined as a beginner participating in their first year (4-H year) showing a particular species. Novice will not be eligible for Champion or "return" classes; novice classes will be blue, red, and white ONLY. No "special awards" will be provided for any novice classes. Novice participants will not be eligible for state fair. Novice or "First year" members have the option to participate in their age division. Only under special circumstances, would a member be allowed to participate in novice more than one year in any species.
- 3. Record Books, Special Awards, County Medals, and Fair Entries Record Books, Fair Entries, Special County Awards, and County Medal Applications are due at the 4-H interview. Every member must register for an interview by June 29, 2023, by 4 pm. Record book interviews will be conducted on July 11, 12, 13, 2023. 4-H'ers must bring their completed records to the interview at that time. Late arrivals, incomplete entries, incomplete record books will not be accepted and will not be able to exhibit at fair. Review the 4-H Record Book requirements and acquire approved leader

signature before turning in your record book in.

- 4. Ownership Deadlines All market animals must be owned and in possession of the member by spring weigh-in dates established each year by the Malheur County Junior Livestock Sale Committee (MCJLSC). All horses must be either owned or under lease agreement by April 20, 2023, by 4:00 pm, with a lease agreement for each horse leased on file at the County Extension Office. All breeding livestock and small animals must be either owned or under lease agreement and in possession of member by June 1. A signed lease agreement for each leased animal must be on file at the County Extension Office no later than June 1, 2023, by 4:00 pm.
- **5. Fair Exhibit Check-in/out** Refer to fair schedule for check-in/out times requirements including paperwork.
- 6. Market Animal Required Paperwork All 4-H youth exhibiting market animals must meet the Spring Weigh-in deadlines and requirements set by the Malheur County Junior Livestock Sale Committee. Change of ownership, brand inspection certificate (E-slip) or brand inspection slips (beef) will be required at final weigh-in. Completed health forms must be turned in at the final weigh-in for market animals and required for consigned dairy heifers. Brand inspection slips and Feed Affidavits are required before cattle will be loaded on truck.
- **7. Animal Health Rules** of open class exhibits apply to 4-H exhibits while exhibiting at the Malheur County Fair.
- 8. Medications and Drug Use in Animals Prior to administering ANY medication or drugs contact the 4-H Agent, 4-H Species Superintendent and Fair Vet. The use of drugs, off label or illegal, or any herbal formula on market animals is not allowed or tolerated. Random drug testing of any animal may occur. See Livestock Health Requirements in Malheur County Fair General Rules, Livestock Health Requirements and MCJLS Drug Policy.
- 9. Showmanship 4-H livestock exhibitors need to be an enrolled member and use their own or leased animal in showmanship contests. Members are required to participate in showmanship for each project area entered in the fair. Judges may ask questions about the member's animal in showmanship, breeding, and market contests. All 4-H Animal Science members must participate in showmanship contests with each species being exhibited at fair. All horse members must participate in horse showmanship. If participating in Ranch Horse, Ranch Horse showmanship is required. Members participating in both livestock and horse projects will participate in both livestock and horse showmanship. If more than 10 are entered in any showmanship class, the class may be divided into two or more sections for judging, at the discretion of the 4-H staff.
- **10. Round Robin Showmanship Contest** will have Champion and Reserve Champion participants from Junior, Intermediate, and Senior age divisions. Novice will not participate in Round Robin. If the member wins more than one showmanship contest, they choose the one they want to compete in, and the next showman moves up. A 4-H member may participate in both Small Animal and Large Animal Round Robin. You must inform the 4-H Agent and 4-H Superintendent of your decision by Friday at 5:00 pm. Please check the Exhibitor's Schedule for date and time of Round Robin. Check-

in with the 4-H Agent for instructions. The OSU 4-H Round Robin score card will be used for the contest. Judges will be selected by the 4-H Agent in cooperation with species superintendents.

- 11. 4-H Exhibit Declaration A youth may show in both 4-H and FFA but must be different animals/exhibits in each program. No crossover exhibits except in horse. Member must specify if their market project is 4-H or FFA at spring weigh-in and breeding project by June 1. The 4-H member may not switch after spring weigh-in or declaration dates. All Ranch Horse 4-H participants are required to attend at least four cow work clinics prior to Fair.
- 12. Animal use The same animal may not be entered in more than one section including showmanship contests. Exceptions: championship, member's herd, etc. FFA market animals may not be shown in 4-H showmanship contests. To exhibit 4-H and FFA you must be enrolled in both organizations, animals declared by initial Spring weigh-in dates, and the project must be different animals/exhibit and records must be kept accordingly within that organization. No animal is eligible to enter in both market and breeding stock classes.
- 13. The 4-H Department is a youth show. Care and Fitting - All care and fitting must be completed by the 4-H member. This includes fitting prior to fair. Involvement of adults must be limited to advising. Any 4-H animal fitted for showing by adults or professionals will be declared ineligible for show, premiums, or sale. Care of animals – Members will properly care for their animals each day, including sale day. This means periodic watering, exercise, and washing. Animals not being cared for may be dismissed. General area and wash racks - Use the correct wash rack for the species. No cattle allowed in small animal wash racks. ALL members are responsible to keep wash racks and common areas clean at all times. Neck rope or chain will be always used while in the barns. All beef and dairy animals will have a neck rope or chain with a lead tied to the manger in addition to a halter. Nose tongs/nose rings are not permitted except on bulls. No wire or chain halters allowed at any time. All pens/stalls must be cleaned by 8 A.M. each morning. All 4-H clubs are required to always keep barn area and animals clean and safe. Members may be dismissed if animals or area are neglected. In livestock barns, when not watering animals, hoses will be disconnected from faucets. Y valves must have shutoffs. Fans will be allowed in all barns. In beef barns, misters may be used. No animals will be allowed in the other species barns.
- 14. Show Equipment Animal Science shows provide an opportunity for the public to be exposed to agricultural exhibits. Exhibitors should be mindful of the show equipment being used and the way it is being used. 4-H Agent in collaboration with the species superintendent, reserve the right to decide what constitutes acceptable show equipment and how the equipment is being used by the exhibitor.
- **15. Morning Exhibitor Meetings** All 4-H exhibitors are required to attend the daily 4-H Exhibitor meetings. Small animal and large animal meetings will be held in the beef arena. Horse meetings will take place in the MC Fair Grandstands.
- 16. Dress Code: When participating in 4-H activities, you are representing yourself, your club, your county, and the state 4-H program. Throughout the fair all clothing is to be neat, clean, and appropriate for the activity. Clean long pants-no holes. Collared dress shirt with sleeves, short or long sleeved depending on project, buttoned appropriately. No logos other than 4-H. No bare midriffs. Hats are allowed if required for a project (horse) or at judge's

- discretion. Appropriate closed toed shoes or boots when working with your project and showing. No sandals at any time. Please make sure to have a clean set of clothing for the Market Livestock Sale and Round Robin. All members must wear appropriate clothing and footwear when caring for their animals in the barn and the wash rack. At no time are low cut tops, t-shirts with offensive language, or short shorts appropriate.
- 17. Judging The "Merit" method of judging will be used. Judges will rank the exhibits in 1, 2, 3 order, then divide them into blue, red and white award groups according to quality. Premiums will be paid. No premiums will be paid for champions. In market steer, market lamb, market goat, and market hog classes blue ribbons will be estimated as choice, red ribbons as select and white ribbons as standard. White ribbons are not allowed to sell. Judges' decisions for all exhibits including record books, special awards, and herdsmanship are final.
- **18. Premiums** Exhibitors will not be paid premiums on more than one exhibit per section. No premiums awarded for 4-H Record Books.
- 19. Animal Release No animal including horses can be removed early from the fairgrounds without a checkout form, signed by the superintendent of that division and 4-H agent. END OF FAIR CHECKOUT: All stalls need to be cleaned out, decorations completely taken down, refuse deposited at dump sites and checked by superintendent at the end of fair. Checkout times are provided in the fair schedule. Please do not leave until a superintendent, 4-H Agent or Livestock Agent have checked your stall(s). \$25.00 fee will be charged to the exhibitor if stalls are not clean at checkout.
- **20. Grievance** When a situation can't be resolved by the 4-H Agent, Leader, and/or Superintendent, the concern or issue will be addressed by a variance committee. A variance committee consisting of 4-H Agent, a 4-H Leader, outside Extension Agent from another county, and the species superintendent will work to resolve concerns brought forth to the 4-H Agent. The grievance must be submitted in writing to the 4-H Agent by the youth, volunteer, and/or parent.
- 21. Awards Ensuring that generous donations of awards are acknowledged is of utmost importance. Members are required to write well-written thank you cards. Thank you notes must be submitted and approved by superintendent within 2 hours of completion of show. ALL thank you notes are submitted to the species superintendent before awards are given. Do not bring Thank You cards to the 4-H Fair Office.
- **22. Fair Passes** All 4-H'ers must possess a season pass or day pass for each day present at fair.
- **23.** All campers will have an adult 21 years or older stay with them in the camping area.
- **24.** All exhibitors will have adult supervision during the County Fair.
- **25.** All judges (except Record Books, Special Awards, County Medals, and Round Robin) shall be hired by the Fair Board in accordance with Fair Board policy.
- 26. Release Time Livestock, Horse, Small Animals, and Static projects is on the Exhibitor's Schedule. ALL EXHIBITORS must check out with the 4-H Agent or Superintendent on the final day of fair. ALL EXHIBITORS are responsible for proper care and cleaning until ALL their animals are loaded on the truck and removed from the fairgrounds. If not properly cared for the exhibitor may not be able to exhibit at future shows and incur a \$25.00/day charge.

4-H Contests



RECORD BOOK CONTEST

Records are required for all fair contestants and for certain special awards. Deadline for scheduling a record book, county medal, and special award interview is June 29th, 2023. Call the Extension Office to schedule. Record book, county medal, and special award interviews will take place on July 11, 12, 13, 2023. Check award listings for specific information. Intermediate and senior 4-H members applying for county medals must turn in all records, application, and participate in an additional interview. Please call the 4-H Extension office to schedule. Specific county fair awards designated as requiring records and/or a county medal must complete and turn in their 4-H records, the county medal application form & procedures for special awards at the time of their interview. 4-H Records are entered into junior, intermediate, and senior classes with ribbons awarded. Special awards will be awarded to the top records in each division. No premiums.

4-H NEWS REPORTERS CONTEST

News reporters may enter a minimum of three actual newspaper clippings of stories written by the 4-H club news reporter and published in a newspaper. The entry is to be submitted and fastened in a 4-H folder (available from the Malheur Co. Extension Office), with the member's name, title and club name on front of the folder. Special display ribbons awarded. No premiums.

4-H SECRETARY CONTEST

Secretaries may enter a minimum of three sets of club minutes taken and written by the 4-H club secretary. The entry is to be submitted and fastened in a 4-H folder, with the member's name, title and club name on the front of the folder. Special display ribbons awarded. No premiums.

SCRAPBOOK CONTEST

All members may enter a Scrapbook of their 4-H memorabilia including ribbons, pictures, certificates and other items a member wishes to include relating to the 4-H project(s). Project books should not be included. Special display ribbons awarded. No premiums.

COUNTY MEDALS

County Medals are available to recognize 4-H members in project or activity areas who have demonstrated advanced accomplishments in a 4-H project, as well as in leadership and citizenship activities. County Medal applications are due at the time of interviews on July 11, 12, 13, 2023 and require a registration to the OSU 4-H Extension office by June 29, 2023. Eligibility-Members must be intermediate or senior members. Members may receive only one project medal per year, Members may also receive a Fashion Revue Medal or an Achievement Medal in the same year they receive a project medal, if merited by outstanding accomplishment, members may receive the same medal once as an Intermediate and once as a Senior. (Exception: Fashion Revue and Achievement Medals may only be awarded once to any member). Application Procedure-Applications for county medals can be made in two ways: 1) The

4-H leader nominates members and has him or her fill out a County Medal Application Form. The leader then writes a recommendation and signs the application form; or 2) A member initiates his or her own nomination by completing a County Medal Application Form and taking it to his or her leader for signature and leader recommendation. Bring all paperwork to your scheduled interview. County Medals will be awarded at the 4-H Recognition Program.

SPECIAL 4-H ANIMAL SCIENCE AWARDS

County 4-H Animal Science Awards are awarded to the Best Livestock Breeding Project- Dr. Leonard Sherman Memorial, Top 4-H Beef Cattle Exhibitor, Best Dairy Breeding Project, Top 4-H Dairy Goat Exhibitor, Top Meat Goat Exhibitor, Best Sheep Breeding Project, Top 4-H Poultry Exhibitor, Top Rabbit Exhibitor and Linda Leininger Memorial 4-H Horse Member Award. Record book scores will be a used in the selection of awards. Awards will be given during the 4-H Recognition Program. Special Animal Science Award applications are due at the time of interviews on July 11, 12, 13, 2023 and require a registration to the OSU 4-H Extension office by June 29, 2023.

Eligibility – Members must be intermediate or senior members. Member must participate in an interview. Animal Science Awards will be awarded at the 4- H Recognition Program.

SPORTSMANSHIP AWARDS

Awards for Sportsmanship will be awarded to 4-H'ers at the 4-H Recognition Program. Friendliness, helpfulness, enthusiasm, and attitude are considered. Nominations are made to the 4-H Agent by 4-H Superintendents, Leaders, and other 4-H members.

4-H CLOVERBUDS (County Only)

4-H Cloverbuds is a 4-H program in Oregon for children 5-8 years old. The 4-H Cloverbuds program appeals to children's natural curiosity, enthusiasm for learning and high energy level by providing an opportunity for active hands-on learning in a noncompetitive environment. Malheur County 4-H members enrolled in 4-H Cloverbuds may enter one or both of the following exhibit classes for display only. Exhibits will not be judged. Each exhibit will be awarded a participant ribbon.

Section No.

CLO. 01. Scrapbook or journal of mementos, stories, pictures, drawings showing 4-H Cloverbud activities during the club year. CLO. 02. One to three projects completed during club year. CLO. 03 MCF Show & Tell Class with small animal

4-H Animal Science Division

Animal Science shows provide an opportunity for the public to be exposed to agricultural exhibits. Exhibitors should be mindful of the show equipment being used and the way it is being used. 4-H Agent, species superintendent, and species judge reserve the right to decide what constitutes acceptable show equipment and how the equipment is being used by the exhibitor.

HEALTHY ANIMALS

By entry into the County Fair, the 4-H exhibitor and associated parties, agree to the following:

- 1. All animals may be subject to health or veterinary inspection at any time from arrival on the grounds to departure from the grounds.
 - While an effort will always be made to have the exhibitor with the animal during an inspection, this may not always be possible.
- **2.** No animal will be allowed to remain on the grounds if it shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease or any unsightly disease conditions such as warts, ringworm, fungus, etc.
 - Objections can be reviewed by the on-call veterinarian, at the owner's expense; the on call/on-site veterinarian decision is final
- 3. Animals considered unsightly for any reason will also be subject to removal from the show and the grounds. "Unsightly" in this case is defined as an appearance of unhealthiness or an appearance of poor care or husbandry; this might include animals obviously and/ or significantly under-weight, animals in poor condition due to age or other circumstances, or animals not handling the stress of the show conditions for reasons beyond our control.

It is important animals not only be healthy, but that they also appear healthy. Animals at the fair are on display; they represent not just the member, their club, their county or even our state, but the agriculture and animal science industry as well as youth raising animals, nationwide. Even owners who take the utmost care of their animals can have unfortunate circumstances which lead to an animal not at its best. 4-H will not subject our youth to the scrutiny an "unsightly" animal may bring. Therefore, a 4-H staff member, committee for animal health, or veterinarian may encourage or suggest an animal be removed for this reason. The 4-H Staff Member in charge of animal science will make the final decision and it will be final.

4. Exhibitors agree they have reviewed and will abide by the Oregon 4-H Animal Science Ethical Standards and they understand that a violation of these ethical standards will be treated, including potential disciplinary action, just as any other violation of expected conduct.

BIO-SECURITY

- 1. As part of maintaining animal health and safety, members are expected to do their best at following some simple bio-security measures. Obviously, any show brings challenges if a contagion is present, this is why it is so critically important to only bring healthy animals to the show, but even under the most crowded conditions, there are things each of us can do in an effort to not spread contaminants.
 - Only bring healthy animals to the show
 - When possible, don't let animals touch noses (very difficult for some species in classes and waiting)
 - Don't share grooming or fitting items
 - Don't share feed pans or buckets
 - Don't go from pen to pen petting on animals that haven't previously been housed together
 - Don't stuff hoses into water buckets, let the water fall into the bucket
 - Invite the public to wash their hands if they touch your animal, know where the nearest handwashing station is and/or have disinfectant wipes available for them

 If you suspect you've been in contact with something contagious, change clothes, wash, etc.

UNHEALTHY ANIMALS

If you suspect an animal to be unhealthy, or have a contagious or infectious disease, be respectful and ask the right people to follow up.

- **1.** If there is a club leader, you may always go to them first and share your concerns.
- 2. Find the superintendent for the species and share your concerns.
- **3.** Remember, they may follow up and a veterinarian may disagree with your diagnosis, the on-call veterinarian's call is final.
- **4.** Contact the 4-H Staff member in charge of animal science if you have additional concerns or feel action has not been taken.
- **5.** Refrain from spreading rumors, opinions, or disparaging the 4-H member or volunteers.

LIVESTOCK OWNERSHIP

- 1. All animals exhibited must have been cared for in a 4-H project by the exhibitor since spring weigh-in deadlines or June 1 (whichever is first).
- **2.** Registered animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. (Registration in a partnership or family name is acceptable if the 4-H member's animals have been designated at the beginning of the project).
- **3.** Exhibitors must own the animals they exhibit (exceptions: leased animals and brace dogs).
- **4.** 4-H exhibitors are not allowed to share an animal in Livestock and Small Animal Projects. Exception: Two or more members of the same family may share an animal in the Dog project.
- **5.** Owners of cattle should provide haulers with transportation certificates to identify ownership.

LEASED ANIMALS

Members may lease animals as long as:

- a. Copies of all leases specifying responsibilities of lessee and lessor are to be on file at the county Extension office before June 1. (Horses, due by April 20, 2023.)
- b. Members have the care responsibility on or before June 1, (Horses, by April 20, 2023)

Including:

- i. A clear understanding of feed and care regiment
- ii. Actual time feeding and caring for the animal
- iii. Do all their own fitting and show preparation

This does NOT mean animals must reside at the member's residence or facility.

HOUSING OF 4-H LIVESTOCK

- 1. Each exhibitor shall furnish the necessary feed for their animals and arrange for their care. Traditionally, shavings have been provided for all animals. Straw and special shavings may not be available. Check with your Extension staff or the state website when it gets closer to the show to determine bedding availability.
- **2.** Exhibitors must provide their own hay, feed, feeders and water buckets.

- 3. All animals exhibited in 4-H classes must be housed and groomed in the 4-H designated area. Typically, overnight tie-outs have not been allowed; however, if space is available, beef tie outs may become available.
- **4.** Only animals exhibited in 4-H classes may be kept in the 4-H barn/area.
- 5. All beef and dairy cattle must be double tied (halter and neck rope).
- **6.** Animals waste and combustible material will be dumped in designated areas only.
 - 7. Swine pens are to be <u>completely</u> cleaned <u>daily</u>.
- **8.** No muzzles allowed. In special occasions, if animal requires a muzzle, it must be agreed to by the superintendent and the 4-H Staff member in charge. The member or other exhibitor must be present at the pen any time the animal is muzzled. The exhibitor is expected to greet and educate all public who are interested in why the muzzle is being used. If necessary, instead of a muzzle, indoor/outdoor carpet or other bedding may be used.
- **9.** All pens must be cleaned and stripped before you leave the grounds on Sunday.

SHOWING

- 1. 4-H members must show their own animals unless excused by the 4-H Agent and species superintendent.
- **2.** Abusive language, unsportsmanlike conduct, or abuse of an animal in any contest can be reason for dismissal from the show ring and/or the show, at the discretion of the show superintendent.
- 3. The 4-H Division is a youth show. All care and fitting must be done by the 4-H exhibitor. Exhibitors should be able to demonstrate if asked. Involvement of adults must be limited to advising. Any 4-H animal fitted for showing by adults or professional will be declared ineligible for showing. 4-H animals must be fitted in the 4-H barn area.
- 4. Sheep, lambs, and goats must be shown with their front feet on the ground.
- **5.** All exhibitors will abide by the Oregon 4-H Animal Science Ethical Standards. Not abiding by these or other rules, is a serious violation of expected conduct and significant consequences may apply.

SHOWMANSHIP

- 1. 4-H livestock exhibitors need to be an enrolled member and use their own or leased animal in showmanship contests. Members are required to participate in showmanship for each project area entered in the fair. Judges may ask questions about the member's animal in showmanship, breeding, and market contests. All 4-H Animal Science members will participate in showmanship contests with each species being exhibited at fair. All horse members must participate in horse showmanship. If participating in Ranch Horse, Ranch Horse showmanship is required. Members participating in both livestock and horse projects will participate in both livestock and horse showmanship.
- **2.** Champions in each **livestock** project and age (in junior, intermediate, and senior. No novice) division are expected to participate in the Round Robin Showmanship class.
- **3. Round Robin Showmanship Contest** will have Champion and Reserve Champion participants from junior, intermediate, and senior age division. No novice age division. If the member wins more than one showmanship contest, they choose the one

they want to compete in, and the next showman moves up. A 4-H member may participate in both small animal and large animal round robin. You must inform the 4-H Agent and 4-H Superintendent of your decision by Friday at 5:00 pm. Please check the Exhibitor's Schedule for date, time, and location of Round Robin. Check-in with the 4-H Agent prior to Saturday for instructions. The OSU 4-H Round Robin Score Card will be used for the contest. Judges will be selected by the 4-H Agent in cooperation with species superintendents.

LIVESTOCK IUDGING AND AWARDS

- 1. The judge's decision is FINAL.
- **2.** The "Merit" method of judging will be used. Judges will divide exhibits into Blue, Red and White award groups according to quality. They may then rank the top 2+ as needed for returns and champion- ship designation.
- **3.** A champion and reserve champion will be selected only when the judge deems there are entries of champion quality.

Breeding Sheep, Meat Goat, Fiber Goat, and Swine-Champion and reserve of each breed will be selected when deemed appropriate. One champion and reserve champion shall be selected in the crossbreed classes based on commercial standards. These Champions and in some cases, Reserve Champion selections will return to select a Supreme Female.

In all Market or Wether classes, – Champion and reserve champion wether. All wethers competing together.

Dairy Goat and Dairy Cattle will separate into JR and SR animals. Each breed will select best two for returns; In the return class, CH and RC Junior or Senior animal will be selected, these will then return for a supreme Female award. Depending on numbers, superintendents have the flexibility to break classes up by breed, instead of bringing CH and RC of each breed, regardless of age, back for a Supreme Female award.

Cattle will be grouped by: British, Continental, AOB, and Crossbred categories. Each area will return selected blues, deemed appropriate; both Junior and senior animals. Champion and Reserve Champions of each category will be chosen and those animals returned for Supreme Female selection.

Fleeces-Champion and reserve champion of each breed, and a grand champion of all breeds.

Rabbit and Cavy-Champion and reserve champion of each breed, if 6 or more of that breed are represented.

Poultry and Pigeon-Champion and reserve champion of each breed. If 6 or more birds of that breed are represented.

Dogs-Champion and reserve champion in each class of Obedience. Champion and reserve champion as well as up to Top 8 Medals of Merit in each age division of Showmanship. Companion pet class may also receive a Medal of Merit if judge deems them worthy.

Showmanship-Intermediate and senior champion and reserve champion in all areas except horse.

All areas, and all classes may be broken down differently depending on numbers, exhibitors and breeds present with superintendent and staff approval.

4. All champions and reserve champions must have won a blue award and be of championship quality as determined by the judge. In "other breeds" breeding classes, each breed and variety will be judged as a separate breed, and will be eligible for awards when deemed appropriate by numbers, by judge, or by superintendent.

- **5.** Non-registered (grade) females shall be entered in the breed class.
- **6.** Crossbred females may be shown in 4-H classes. They shall be entered in the crossbred class.
- **7.** When purebred females with crossbred calves are shown in the dam and daughter class, they shall be shown in the class designated by breed of dam.
- **8.** If a member shows a mixed herd, it will be shown in the "other breeds" category.

HERDSMANSHIP

The 4-H Herdsmanship Contest is designed to help 4-H members learn skills in making a presentable exhibit for the public as well as learn skills in teamwork, courtesy, cooperation, neatness, and proper care of animals. Members will compete representing their club in Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy, Dairy Goats, Pygmy Goats, Fiber Goat, Meat Goats and llama/alpaca.

All equipment, including wheel barrows, shovels, fitting stands, etc., MUST be labeled with the Club name. All materials used to decorate must be fire retardant.

BASIS FOR SCORING:

Members & Promotion30 points

Appearance (hard soled shoes, completed stall cards present), friendliness, courtesy, conduct, cooperation and work done by members. Club must be clearly identified. Decorations are required. Preference is for member(s) to be present.

Securely tied or penned, clean, comfortable, and safely stalled. Animal's well-being is being evaluated considering the exhibitor's attention to proper feeding, handling, disease prevention, sanitation and concern for the animal's safety.

Exhibit Area30 points

Area is clean and orderly; stalls clean and well bedded; tack, grooming and cleaning equipment is properly stored, labeled with club name; buckets secured or removed if empty; barn aisles swept and clean; feed area, associated fitting stands and areas neat, clean and orderly.

- Herdsmanship may be judged daily.
- Awards will be announced daily.

RABBITS

Read Animal Science Rules and Health Requirements.

Please look in the Exhibitor's Schedule in regards to delivery and mandatory rabbit health checks on the day of the show.

4-H members must be present to show their rabbits. Members will carry their rabbits to the judging table and show them while they are being judged. Members may leave rabbits in carrying cages, use cages already set up or set up their own. No rabbits are allowed on grounds except those to be exhibited. Permanent identification is recommended. Members will provide their own carpet square or mat at the show table.

Any rabbit that has a permanent defect will be placed in the white ribbon group. Any rabbit that has a correctable problem shall, at the judges' discretion, be placed in the Red or White ribbon group.

Any rabbit that does not fit in a breed standard should be placed in the crossbred class. The crossbred class will be judged on condition.

Members must bring the same dog(s) for competition at State Fair as was shown at the county level by the member.

Dogs are not permitted on the Fairgrounds except to participate in 4-H Dog Show classes and then only in designated areas; therefore, dogs not entered in the show are NOT allowed. Dogs may not be taken to other areas of the Fairgrounds, even if on a leash.

If members are traveling a great distance and need to stay overnight, they will have to make their own arrangements for their dogs – RV spaces will be available.

Remember, all dogs must be in hand or crated, so be sure you bring everything you need to keep your dog healthy and happy.

Members bringing dogs to the County Fair are required to have their dogs currently vaccinated against Rabies, DH or DHP and Parvovirus. No health certificate is required. However, if a dog has a visible skin or physical problem, a certificate from a veterinarian is required indicating the condition is not contagious nor harmful to the dog during competition. Females in season will be shown at the end of the day and should remain in the area specified by the show chair during the day.

<u>Crates</u> are required for all dogs. (Exercise pens are NOT allowed) All dogs must be "on lead" while on the Fairgrounds. Drilling and correction while on the show grounds is not allowed. Dogs must

wear properly fitted collars; spiked and pronged collars and head harnesses are not allowed on the grounds. Aggressive dogs will not be tolerated and will be excused from the show and the vicinity. See 4-H 1202, 4-H Dog Obedience, Showmanship and Contest Guide for specific rules.

The Oregon 4-H Dress Code of neat and clean is <u>encouraged</u> and <u>expected</u>; closed toed shoes are also expected. Inappropriate dress such as low cut tops, t-shirts with offensive language or torn jeans are not acceptable.

<u>Animal Requirements</u>

All animals must be in good health. Animals with visible injuries, external parasites, or displaying signs of disease will not be shown and excused from the 4-H County Fair Exotic and Pet Day. Exhibitors showing cats must bring current vaccination records to show cat is up-to-date on rabies and feline distemper (panleukoponia) vaccine.

Any food, water, and equipment necessary to ensure animal well-being must be provided. This will vary depending on animal species. For example, reptiles may require an aquarium with heat source and cats may require a kennel carrier.

Any animal a 4-H youth has had a relationship with for at least six months and is at least nine months old is eligible to be shown at the 4-H County and State Exotic and Companion Pet Day.

<u>Judging Criteria</u>

Members must provide their own kennel/cage/aquarium that allows exhibitor access to the animal, if appropriate for that species, and safely secures animal during scheduled interview time and judging. Exhibitors are responsible for any needs to show their animal. For example, carpet, gloves, brush. Animals that are taken out of their kennel/cage/aquarium must be properly secured with either leash, collar, harness, string tied, etc in order to prevent loss in an unfamiliar, fast-paced environment. This will be by choice of the exhibitor and there will be no points off for securing the animal humanely.

Exhibitors will have a one-on-one interview with a Judge. Exhibitors will be asked a variety of questions regarding their animal, its care, how they came to own it, etc. Judging criteria will be based on member's animal knowledge, interview presence, cleanliness and healthy appearance of animal, and member's

comfort showing and explaining their animal, and educational display content.

During scheduled interview time and while waiting for interview with a Judge, 4-H youth and their animal will have the opportunity to interact with the public. 4-H youth are expected to bring an educational display that helps inform the public on their animal species.

Rules and Regulations

Judges' decisions are final in all classes. Members must check-in with the horse show office at the designated time. Members must be present at morning meetings held in the grand stands. Patterns for classes will be distributed to all horse members and reviewed with the judges at the morning meetings. All stalls and barn area must be clean by 8:00 A.M. and throughout the day. All Horse Exhibitors must adhere to the General Fair Rules for health requirements for horses from out of state.

- **1.** Safety is the number one consideration. If a horse is deemed unsafe by show management and 4-H Agent or FFA Advisor it will be immediately excused from the Fairgrounds.
- **2.** All exhibitors will have adult supervision during the County Fair. Parents need to attend registration with their child.
- **3.** All 4-H horse members (including Ranch Horse) are required to participate in horse showmanship, as well as showmanship in the livestock area if they are enrolled in a livestock project.
- **4.** All 4-H and FFA exhibitors are required to turn in health forms on each horse. Random drug testing may be done. Health forms will be on file in 4-H Show Office.
- **5.** All FFA exhibitors must wear Official Dress from waist-up when exhibiting and showing except when excused by the FFA Superintendent. All 4-H & FFA exhibitors are required to wear an ASTM-SEI approved helmet with chinstrap and harness engaged whenever mounted, the exception is showmanship.
- **6.** The 4-H year is Oct. 1- Sept. 30. Youth must be in complete care of horse projects during the show season and no later than

- April 23rd to show at County Fair. The animal can be leased, but a contract shall be signed by April 23rd as such by both parties and on file at the Extension Office. The animal cannot be borrowed.
- **7.** To qualify for State Fair, contestants must use the same horse they qualified with at county fair and must use the same horse used in equitation and showmanship, plus dressage, trail and jumping. A minimum combined score (highest equitation and showmanship) of 170 with no single score being less than 80. Members do not qualify only for showmanship or only for equitation. If a blue ribbon is received in a second or third equitation class, those classes may be entered as well as the first equitation class. Contestants who qualify for State Fair in equitations/showmanship may also enter Dressage if they received a score of 58% or higher on any Dressage Training Level Test 2 or 3 or any First Level test at their county fair using the same horse as used in equitation/showmanship. NOTE: Training Level Test 1 is not eligible for State Fair. Additionally, contestants who qualifty for State Fair in equitation/showmanship may also enter Western Dressage if they received a score of 58% or higher on WDAA Basic Level Test 2-4 or Level 1 Test 1-4. NOTE: This is a new organization and new tests for this year, Basic Level, Test 1 not eligible for State Fair.
- **8.** A wet mare cannot be shown in any classes. Wet mares may attend the Fair with a suckling colt for a ground training project.
 - **9.** Suckling colts may be shown only in ground training.
- **10.** Stud colts, 12 months of age or less, may be shown only in ground training if well mannered. Show superintendent and 4-H Agent or FFA Advisor has the right to excuse unruly stud colts from Fairgrounds.
- **11.** Any horse on the Fairgrounds may be excused for unruly behavior at any time.
- **12.** When two or more members of the same family have only one horse available they may jointly care for, train and show the same horse.
- **13.** When conflicts in riding times occur, members will need to make a decision as to which family member will show. A maximum of 15 minutes will be allowed for delaying an event.
 - 14. The judge has the right to mouth a horse for age.
- **15.** This show regulated according to the current Oregon 4-H Horse Project Manual 4-H130 & 4-H Horse Contest Guide 4-H13011
 - **16.** In showmanship, horses may be shown according to breed type.
- 17. Horses 5 years of age or younger may be ridden in a snaffle or bosal. For horses 6 years old or more, a curb bit is highly preferred. Members showing horses 6 or older in a snaffle or bosal must have a performance significantly better than a member showing a 6-year-old or older horse in a curb bit to be placed above them.
- **18.** Tie downs, draw reins, martingales, mechanical hackamores, and nosebands are prohibited. Exceptions include the use of cavessons and running martingales if adjusted properly are allowed in Hunt Seat Equitation Over Fences, and in Junior Horse, running martingales are allowed, if adjusted properly. Check current 4-H Horse Contest Guide to meet all requirements.
- 19. No parent, leader or spectator shall approach a judge for any reason unless they first obtain permission from the Horse Superintendents. The Horse Superintendents will arrange an appointment with the judge at a proper time and place. The Superintendent will be present at the meeting. Exhibitors may ask the judge to comment on his or her performance after a class is completed. The Judges' decision is final.
- **20.** In order to ride any horse in a class, the youth must have project records on that horse. This includes family-owned horses.
 - 21. Hoof polish will not be allowed.

- 22. Adults may not ride members' horses.
- **23.** Riders will be disqualified from all events if caught riding in tennis shoes, barefoot or riding the horse with a halter.
 - **24.** No chaps are allowed except in Trail Class and Pleasure.
- 25. State Fair qualification is based on combined score for showmanship & equitation. A minimum of 170 points are required to qualify based on 200 points possible. There are 100 points for showmanship and 100 points possible for equitation. A minimum score of 80 is required for each class.
- **26.** Four wheelers are not allowed except for security & maintenance staff.
- **27.** Do not turn horses loose unattended in the round pen or arenas.
 - 28. Participants will not be allowed to wear Fat Baby boots.
- 29. 4-H horse members are required to completely clean their stalls and remove all decorations. Before departing the fairgrounds at the end of fair, youth must have the approval and signature on fair check- out form of either a Horse Superintendent or 4-H Agent.
 - 30. All judges hired by the Malheur County Fair Board.
- 31. Show management or the judge reserves the right to dismiss any youth or party from any 4-H class or show for any misconduct, lack of sportsmanship, or infractions of the rules. Exhibitors may forfeit all awards received in the class or at the show.

Rules and Regulations

The Ranch Horse Program is open to any enrolled 4-H horse and livestock member in good standing. In the Ranch Horse program (as in all 40H Horse projects) safety is a serious concern. At any time the 4-H Agent, Ranch Horse Superintendent or even judge may dismiss a participant due to safety reasons. All youth participating in Ranch Horse must be a 4-H member to participate. The phases of the program include ranch horse showmanship, cow working, team cow working, working ranch horse (reining), ranch horse trail, roping, identification and skills test. This program has been designed to be a fun informative learning event for youth. Refer to Oregon 4-H Ranch Horse Contest Guide for all rules and class descriptions.

- 1. All 4-H participants must be enrolled in 4-H Ranch Horse Program by 4-H enrollment deadline.
- 2. All 4-H horse rules pertaining to ownership, etc., as listed under 4-H Horse Show will be followed. Health Forms must be completed for each horse and filed with superintendent in 4-H Show Office.
- 3. The Same horse must be used for all events, except for started colt, in accordance with Oregon State 4-H Ranch Horse rules, adopted in 2008. Roping for the current year will be done on the ground unless you pass the safety test (date to be determined).
- 4. To participate in the cow work class, youth are required to attend at least four cow work clinics prior to Fair. There will be a stock charge (cash only) at each event and at fair. CHECKS will NOT be accepted. Dates for cow clinics will be announced in the 4-H newsletter. Make-up clinics are at the discretion of the Ranch Horse Superintendent.
- **5.** A signed release of liability must be signed by parent or guardian to participate at the Fair. These will be turned in to the 4-H Horse Office.
 - **6.** All scoring will be on the Danish merit system.
- 7. Premium monies will be paid on each event. Special awards will be awarded to the High Point senior, intermediate, junior and novice ranch horse member. To be eligible to win a High Point Award, youth are required to participate in all events, except Ranch Horse Started Colt.
- **8.** Judges shall be hired by the Fair Board in accordance with Fair Board policy.
 - 9. Working Cow Horse, Ranch Horse Showmanship, Trail and

Roping rules, reining patterns, started colt, team cow working, knots & restraints, and equipment lists are included in the 4-H Ranch Horse resource packet.

- 10. When showing horses 6 years old or older, a proper curb bit is preferred. These horses may be shown in a snaffle or bosal, but when compared with an equal pattern ridden with a curb, preference will be given to the rider with the curb unless the horse in the snaffle or bosal is 5 years and under. A rider who uses two hands at any time on a stiff bit will be penalized points, except in the Ranch Horse Started Colt. No mechanical hackamores are allowed.
- **11.** ASTM-SEI approved helmets, boots, and long sleeved shirts are required for all participants.

****NO FAT BABIES BOOTS ARE ALLOWED.****

- 12. Tie downs, draw reins, running martingales, and nosebands
- 13. Riders will be disqualified from all events if caught riding in tennis shoes, barefoot or riding the horse in a halter at any time.
- **14.** Ranch Horse will be a two day event, which will be held on Friday and Saturday.

Cloverbuds participants are not allowed to use a horse in Ranch Horse but they are able to participate in Classes 1206C and 1206F (dummy roping only).

Malheur County Started Ranch Colt Program (MCSRC): Preregistration is required for all participants in order to compete. All youth must have gone through the application and selection process. All participants will be in one group for the events. All members must check in prior to the MCSRC show. Members must check-in with the horse office on Monday morning and complete the vet check prior to competing. All 4-H rules found in the 4-H Horse Contest Guide, PNW 574 apply, unless otherwise noted here.

Rules and Regulations:

The MCSRC program is open to any enrolled 4-H/FFA horse member in good standing. Youth have applied, went through the selection process and have been assigned a colt for this program. In the MCSRC program youth safety is the highest priority. At any time the 4-H Agent, MCSRC Superintendent or the judge may dismiss a participant for safety reasons. The events for the MCSRC program are: In-Hand Trail, Trail, and Beginning Cow Working. This program is designed to be a fun, challenging and rewarding learning

experience for youth participants.

- 1. All participants must be enrolled in the MCSRC program by the enrollment deadline.
- **2.** All participants are required to be approved and selected by the MCSRC board.
- **3.** All horses must be of working ranch horse type, gelded and approved by the MCSRC board. The MCSRC board has the final say on which participant receives which horse.
- **4.** The selected and approved colt must be used for all MCSRC events at the Malheur County Fair.
- **5.** To participate in the MCSRC program, participants are required to attend a minimum of 10 practice sessions with the lead instructor.
 - 6. The MCSRC colts may be ridden in a snaffle or bosal.
 - 7. All scoring will be based on the Danish merit system of judging.
- **8.** Premium monies will be paid on each event. Participants who earn a blue ribbon, will be awarded a medallion when deemed appropriate by the judge in each event.
- **9.** Riders are expected to adhere to all 4-H Horse Contest Guide rules regarding safety, appropriate equipment, and conduct at all times during the show. Safety violations will be met with significant consequences.
 - MCSRC is a one-day event, refer to schedule for days and times.
 MCSRC-A In-Hand Trail

This class is an in-hand test of horse control and of the handler's ability to guide the horse safely through a series of ranch related obstacles. A ranch type halter is recommended. Since this is not a mounted event, helmets are not required, however a cowboy hat is required. Spurs and chaps are not allowed. The course will contain 6-10 obstacles and is designed to be completed in less than 5 minutes.

MCSRC-B Trail

This class is a test of horse control and of the rider's ability to guide the horse through a series of ranch related obstacles. The course will be the same as the In-Hand Trail course.

Beginning Cow Working

This class is an assessment of the rider and the colts' ability to effectively hold, and/or move cattle as if they were working on a ranch. Riders should demonstrate proper position and understanding of the flight zone and point of balance while maintaining control of the cattle. Participants may also be expected to demonstrate their colt's ability to work while the rider swings, throws, and carries a rope. A tracking simulator may be used to help the rider demonstrate these skills. Contest procedures may vary.

Also see General Rules

- o1. Any FFA member in good standing with a Malheur County Chapter or a candidate for the Greenhand degree may participate.
- 02. All Crop and Ag Mechanic exhibits must be entered on Monday of fair, Noon to 7 pm.
- o3. FFA members entering livestock must care for and exhibit their own animals or arrange for this to be done.
- o4. Official dress is required when exhibiting and showing animals except when excused by the FFA Superintendent or official judge. Black jeans/slacks are permitted. Dark/black close-toed shoes are acceptable as long as they are appropriate for the class. The following items are not permitted in the show ring: blue jeans, any footwear not close-toed and dark/black, any boots OVER black pants, sunglasses, shorts, yoga pants, hats, including cowboy hats.
- o5. All exhibitors required to show and sell own animal or make prior arrangements with FFA Superintendent.
- o6. Livestock foundation classes shall consist of three females.
- o7. Health forms for all market animals need to be filled out completely and turned in at time of weigh-in.
- o8. Premiums may be withheld from members whose advisor or assistant is not present to take care of his/her responsibilities during the Fair
- o9. A student may show in both 4-H and FFA but must choose animals for each division before June 1 of current year. Each animal must have a permanent identification.
- 10. All market animals must be owned and in possession of member by appropriate tagging date. All breeding livestock and horses must be either owned or under lease agreement and in possession of member by June 1.
- 11. Animals which cannot be handled by the FFA member may not be shown in FFA classes or sold through the auction sale.
- 12. All Beef and Dairy animals will have a neck rope or chain with a lead tied to the manger in addition to a halter. This neck rope or chain shall be used at all times while in the barns.
- 13. Exhibitors should notify their Agriculture Instructor by June 30 of their stall needs so that instructors can secure sufficient space.
- 14. All exhibitors will take part in an FFA showmanship contest.

- 15. FFA members are eligible to exhibit and participate in stock sales for 1 full year after the fair that follows graduation (two fairs).
- 16. No animal can be removed from the fairgrounds without a checkout form signed by the superintendent of that division.
- 17. In order to show at the Malheur County Fair, FFA members must be a member of an FFA program that is located in Malheur County, i.e. Adrian, Harper, Jordan Valley, Nyssa, Ontario, or Vale.
- 18. FFA members may only sell an animal in one county fair.
- 19. FFA members may only sell one animal at the Malheur County Fair. This includes any separate 4-H projects that the FFA member may have if they are a member of both organizations.
- 20. The Round Robin Showmanship Contest will have Champion and Reserve Champion participants from Beef, Dairy, Swine, Boer goat, Dairy goat, Sheep, and Ranch and Performance Horse. In the case that a student qualifies for Round Robin with more than one species, they must declare which species they will show no later than 1 hour from the conclusion of the last show. In this case the next highest placed student that has received a blue ribbon would be eligible to compete. A maximum of 2 students per species.
- 21. **All Animal Exhibitors** are required to completely clean their stalls and remove all decorations before departing the fair grounds at the end of fair. Youth must have the approval and signature on fair checkout form of division superintendent or FFA Advisor.
- 22. All animals being exhibited at the fair must pass a health check by the Fair veterinarian prior to being unloaded and stalled at the fair.
- 23. Enterprises carried in 4-H during the current year may not be exhibited in the FFA Division by an FFA member. See 4-H/FFA Agreement for further clarifications. There is an exception for FFA members who are also 4-H members showing horses.
- 24. Exhibitors are allowed **two** entries per class per division (or division where no classes apply) in each livestock, poultry, rabbit, wool, and photography class, **one** in landscape class and **one** in each crops class, with the exception of "Any Other Variety" in which up to five different varieties may be entered. **Note:** Not more than one of the same variety in "Any Other Variety" may be entered. Ten different cultivars per class in Nursery, two

- unlike entries in each agriculture mechanics class, and one properly fitted showmanship entry in each kind of livestock unless otherwise stated. Members must show their own animal, except in exceptional situations approved by the Sectional Superintendent. Members having two entries in a specific livestock class may have the second animal shown by another FFA member in official dress. Only members and helpers in Official Dress will be allowed to show.
- 25. If there is no competition or an entry is deemed unworthy of the premium offered, the premium may be awarded at the discretion of the judges.
- 26. Animals entered in the FFA Division must be made available for use in the Livestock or Showmanship contests, unless excused by the Superintendent.
- 27. All animals are subject to inspection by the veterinarian in attendance upon admission to the exhibition grounds. No animals shall be admitted to or allowed to remain on the grounds that shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease or any unsightly disease condition such as warts, ringworm, etc.
- 28. Animals not passing health inspection at any time during the fair must be immediately removed from the fairgrounds.
- 29. Novice showmanship classes will be composed of members without any previous experience showing that species of animal, except for juniors and seniors in high school, who will compete as advanced. This follows traditional FFA rules.

FFA GENERAL AWARDS

Malheur County Farm Bureau offers a jacket to the FFA member who enters the largest number of exhibits at the fair. This will be determined by the amount of premium money won. Member must exhibit in at least two of the three divisions.

Boulevard Grange #389 of Ontario will present an award to the exhibitor winning the Round Robin Showmanship. Each Champion and Reserve Champion winner of each division shall compete showing each class of livestock.

The Jim Reed family will give an award to the Reserve Round Robin Showman.

The Malheur County Fair Board will present a special ribbon to the FFA Round Robin Showman and Reserve Showman

The Malheur County Fair Board will present awards for the Best FFA Chapter Livestock Exhibit.

FFA HORSE CLASSES

1. All horse exhibitors must participate in Class 102.

- 2. All members showing horses must wear Official Dress and ASTM-SEI approved helmet with chin harness engaged.
- 3. Meetings will be held each morning in the grandstands. Patterns for classes will be distributed to all horse members and reviewed with the judges.
- 4. All stalls and barn area must be clean by 8 am and throughout the day.
- 5. A wet mare cannot be shown in any classes. Wet mares may attend the Fair with a suckling colt for a ground training project.
 - 6. Suckling colts may be shown only in ground training.
- 7. Stud colts, 12 months of age or less, may be shown only in ground training if well mannered. Unruly stud colts will be excused from the fairgrounds.
- 8. Any horse on the Fairgrounds may be excused for unruly behavior at any time.
 - 9. The judge has the right to mouth a horse for age.
- 10. Horses 5 years of age or younger may be ridden in a snaffle or bosal. For horses 6 years old or more, a curb bit is highly preferred. Members showing horses 6 or older in a snaffle or bosal must have a performance significantly better than a member showing a 6 year old or older horse in a curb bit to be placed above them.
- 11. Tie downs, draw reins, martingales, mechanical hackamores, and nosebands are prohibited. Exceptions include the use of cavessons and running martingales, if adjusted properly, in a Hunt Seat Equitation Over Fences. In Junior Horse, running martingales are allowed, if adjusted properly.
- 12. No parent, leader or spectator shall approach a judge for any reason unless they first obtain permission from the Horse Superintendents. The Horse Superintendents will arrange an

appointment with the judge at a proper time and place. The Superintendent will be present at the meeting. Exhibitors may ask the judge to comment on his or her performance after a class is completed. The Judges' decision is final

- 13. Hoof polish will not be allowed.
- 14. Adults may not ride members' horses.
- 15. FFA members that are also 4-H members may use the same horse for both 4-H and FFA activities.
- 16. Riders will be disqualified from all events if caught riding in tennis shoes, barefoot or riding the horse with a halter.
 - 17. No chaps are allowed except in Trail Class and Pleasure.
- 18. Four wheelers are not allowed except for security & maintenance staff.
- 19. Do not turn horses loose unattended in the round pen or arenas.
- 20. Participants will not be allowed to wear Fat Baby boots.
- 21. Show management or the judge reserves the right to dismiss any youth or party from any class or show for any misconduct, lack of sportsmanship, or infractions of the rules. Exhibitors may forfeit all awards received in the class or at the show.
- 22. Misrepresentation/falsification of a horse's age is grounds for immediate disqualification of that exhibitor from the event.
- 23. The use of drugs, herbal compounds or a surgical procedure which affects an animal's conformation, appearance, natural performance, or in any way alters its natural color will not be condoned. Horses requiring any medication should be identified upon arrival at the registration area. Exhibitors should be prepared to present a valid prescription or written explanation: either or both to be signed by the animal's licensed veterinarian. If a horse requires medication or treatment after arrival on the fairgrounds, any medication used to protect the health and welfare of the animal must be prescribed by a licensed veterinarian. Administration of all medications must at all times be done in accordance with the specification and/or instructions given in the prescription. Liability for the correct administration of the prescribed drug is the responsibility of the exhibitor's parent or legal guardian.
- 23. State Fair qualification is based on combined score for showmanship and equitation. A minimum of 170 points are required to qualify based on 200 points possible. There are 100 points for showmanship and 100 points possible for equitation. A minimum score of 80 is required for each class.

Class 101 WESTERN EQUITATION

Judging is on the performance of the horse and rider. Required movements: Walk, trot, canter, reverse, figure 8, back, stand, and turn, as directed.

Class 102 HORSE SHOWMANSHIP

Contestants will be judged on (1) personal appearance and attitude; (2) condition and grooming of horses and equipment, and (3) ability to show the animal at walk, trot, back and stand as directed.

Class 103 GROUND TRAINING

Contestants may show colts of any age provided they have not been mounted at any time. Male colts older than 12 months must be gelded. Contestant will provide the judge a list of exercises on the scorecard to be attempted, age of the member, age of the animal

and length of training period. Items to be demonstrated are outlined on the score sheet. Score sheets can be obtained at the Extension Office. Evaluation will be based on the horse-trainer abilities. Adults are not allowed to hold horses during this class. Assistants must be other FFA members. 15 minutes will be allotted for this contest; scores will be adjusted if adequate progress has not been made in training related to time horse has been in training.

Class 104 JUNIOR HORSE SHOW CLASS

Contestants in this Class will show 2 to 5 year old horses using snaffle bit or bosal hackamore and ride two handed. Lead change optional. The horse may NOT be shown in ANY class in a shank bit. Horses are eligible for Trail Class. There will be a maximum of 15 minutes allowed. The horse is to never have been shown in a curb bit. Each horse may perform up to eight items from those listed on the score sheet. Running martingales are permitted in this class.

Class 105 TRAIL HORSE

The Trail Class is a test of horse control and of the rider's ability to guide the horse through a series of obstacles. The rider may be English or Western. Western riders may use only one hand on the reins unless it is necessary to transfer the reins. The course will contain seven obstacles and will be typical of what might be encountered on a regular trail. Each obstacle has a value and is scored according to how the rider maneuvers through the entire obstacle. Credit will be given for any positive action.

Class 106 ENGLISH EOUITATION

Any type of clean neat apparel is permissible. Boots (Western or English) are required; spurs of unrowelled type and breastplate are optional. Snaffles (with or without cavesson,) Pelhams or full bridles permissible. Saddles are to be saddle or hunt seat. Martingales, tiedowns or chaps are prohibited. Horses will be required to take proper leads at all gaits (walk, trot, canter and gallop). Posting is to be on outside diagonal unless otherwise stated. Individual work may be required.

Class 107 BAREBACK EQUITATION

No novice members allowed. Exhibitors may be asked to perform any test listed in equitation. Western riders must sit the jog or intermediate gait. English riders must post the trot on the correct diagonal. No mount or dismount is allowed.

Class 108 HUNT SEAT EQUITATION OVER FENCES

No novice members allowed. No horses under 5 years. Contestants are required to wear suitable boots and ASTM F1163-88 SEI approved headgear with chin strap and harness engaged. An English jumping type saddle is required. A safety inspection of equipment will precede any jumping, including warm-ups. Six to eight course jumps will be required. No black plastic allowed. Each contestant may circle once, if desired, before approaching the first jump and shall then proceed around the course keeping an even pace. Performance will be judged on effective use of aids and horse control over entire course. Emphasis will be on light hands, balance, correct posture and seat on the flat and over fences. Jumps are to not exceed 27 inches for juniors, and 30 inches for intermediates or seniors.

Class 109 HARNESS CLASS

All junior exhibitors will have a co-driver in the cart/tub. Intermediates and seniors are eligible to have a co-driver. They may use tub or four wheel cart. They will be judged on appearance of the animal, and of the member, equipment, and performance. Running martingales are accepted for safety. Safety inspection will be held prior to competition.

Class 110 WESTERN PLEASURE

The western pleasure horse is shown at the walk, jog, and lope

in both directions of the arena and is backed at the conclusion of the class. The performance of a western pleasure horse is evaluated by analyzing the horse's performance in three general categories: functional correctness, quality of movement and attitude (or mannerisms). Primary judging emphasis is placed on the gaits, with lesser emphasis on the reverse and/or back unless the horse reverses incorrectly or fails to back.

Class 111 HUNTER UNDER SADDLE

The hunter under saddle is shown at the walk, trot, and canter in both directions of the arena and is backed at the conclusion. This class is evaluated on functional correctness, quality of movement and attitude. The hunter trot differs from the western jog in that the trot stride is substantially longer, freer and more ground covering. The walk and canter also have slightly longer strides than those gaits in western. The hunter under saddle horse is shown with light contact on the bit and no slack in the reins.

White – may not meet trade standard, but is marketable, free from disease, insects, damage, etc.

4-H & FFAMarket & Dairy Heifer Replacement Junior Livestock Auction Rules



The objective of this sale is to provide an outlet for market stock and dairy breeding animals raised in the 4-H and FFA projects. This sale is part of the consumer education efforts of 4-H and FFA with focus on marketing at proper weight, quality grade and producing a desirable carcass or breeding animal from the consumer and producer standpoint.

GENERAL RULES

- 1. An auction of market animals and dairy breeding stock meeting the specification outlined in these guidelines and exhibited at the Malheur County Fair will sell at the Junior Livestock Auction occurring during the fair.
- 2. Treating an animal internally or externally in any way to misrepresent the true nature of an animal is prohibited. The use of dyes and spray paint or other artificial means which result in altering the animal's true and natural color is not allowed. Violations of these rules may result in the member being banned from future sales and all awards, premiums and sale proceeds being withheld. Acceptable practices of physical preparation include: clipping of hair or fleece, trimming of hooves, dehorning, and removal of ancillary teats and docking of tails.
- 3. The use of drugs, off label or illegal, or any herbal formula on market animals or dairy breeding stock sold through auction is not allowed. Evidence of such will disqualify the exhibitor from the show, sale, and premiums. Any carcasses found positive for drug residues will be the responsibility of the exhibitor and they must forfeit market sales receipts back to the sale committee. Random drug testing of any animal may occur.
- 4. 4-H and FFA members must adhere to livestock health requirements set by the Malheur County Fair Board.
- 5. All animals sold need to be entered and shown by the owner of the animal in the market classes. In order to be eligible to sell, a student must exhibit in the showmanship class of the species they entered and intended to sell. Animals not shown by the member owning the animals will not be sold.
- 6. Any market animal injured at home or en route to fairgrounds will not be weighed and will not be eligible to show even in showmanship and will be sent home. Any animal injured at the fairgrounds will be assessed by the superintendent, fair veterinarian and sale committee to decide whether it can be shown.
- 7. Animals which have been previously sold through a finished market animal sale connected with a fair or livestock show are not eligible for exhibition.
- 8. Thank you notes to all buyers and anyone who may add-on or bump up the price of animals are required by all youth selling in the sale. Checks will not be released until buyers thank you notes are turned in.
- 9. All 4-H/FFA members planning to participate in the MCJLS and sell an animal (except dairy heifers) are required to sign and submit the Market Animal Memorandum of Understanding. This memorandum must be signed to sell a market animal. This also includes all back up animals.

SPRING WEIGH-IN

- **1.** All animals in the market animal program must have been owned and in the possession of 4-H club or FFA chapter members by the official weigh-in or possession date. All required paperwork related to transfer of ownership is required at spring weigh-in.
- 2. All market beef must be dehorned and males must be castrated or banded prior to spring weigh-in. All market hogs must be castrated prior to possession date. All market lambs must be USDA scrapie tagged, castrated or banded prior to possession date or spring weigh-in. All market goats must be USDA scrapie tagged, castrated one week or banded prior to possession date or spring weigh-in.
- **3.** All animals must meet the following weight guidelines at spring weigh-in; BEEF- 950 pound maximum; GOAT- Must still be showing milk teeth at weigh-in. No weigh requirements for other species.
- 4. Youth may tag one dairy heifer, two steers, two hogs, two goats, two lambs, two pens of roaster and fryer rabbits and two pens of roaster and fryer chickens. ONLY ONE MARKET ANIMAL IN EACH DIVISION MAY BE SHOWN. An exhibitor may sell only one animal or pen regardless of the number of projects exhibited at the fair.
- **5.** A family unit may tag an extra animal in each species for use by a member of that immediate (i.e. brother, sister, step-sibling or living in the household during the time of the project) family and a specific exhibitors name does not have to be registered at the time of spring weigh-in. (EXAMPLE: Three kids in family unit tag one market steer each; the family unit may tag an extra steer to be designated as the FAMILY EXTRA, so each kid does not have to tag two steers. Any of these three kids could choose to use the FAMILY EXTRA steer.)
- 6. Steers will be ear-tagged at weigh-ins. Pens of rabbits (3 or 4 animals) and chickens (3 or 4 animals) will be visibly photographed in cage next to owner. Hogs photographed with one hog per photo. There will be four sides submitted per hog with one picture including the owner. Sheep and goats will have USDA scrapie's tag documented at the time of procession date. Photographs submitted on sheep and goats will include the scrapie's tag in the animal's ear and the animal with the owner. This includes all back-up animals that may be used as replacements at time of fair. All photographs must be submitted by the possession date pertaining to each
- 7. Allowable breeds to be sold in the Junior Livestock Sale: Goats-Boer, Kiko, Spanish/Boer, Savanna or Cross Breeds of these Breeds. Poultry-Cornish Cross, Jersey Giants, Bresse, Freedom Ranger, Red Ranger, Rolins. Rabbits-New Zealand, American, Californian, Blanc de Hotot, American Chinchilla, Silver Fox, Champagne, Cinnamons, Satins, Standard Rex, Palomino, Flemish Giants, American Sable or Cross Breeds of the above. Sheep-Cheviot, Dorset, Hampshire, Montadale, North County Cheviot, Katahdrin, Oxford, Shropshire, Southdown, Suffolk, Texel, Blue Texel, Tunis, Leicester, Dorper or Cross Breeds of the above. Hogs-American Yorkshire, Berkshire,

Chester White, Duroc, Hampshire, Hereford, Landrace, Poland China, Spotted, Tamworth or Cross Breeds of the above.

FAIR WEIGH-IN

- **1.** All 4-H and FFA market animals must be weighed at scheduled spring weigh-ins in order to exhibit at fair and sell in the sale. All animals must be in place by 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday of fair.
- 2. Unruly animals that cannot be handled by the exhibitor will be evaluated by a variance committee consisting of the 4-H Agent (4-H Extension representation if 4-H Agent is not available), Species Superintendent, FFA Advisor and two voting members of the Jr. Sale Committee. Determination will be made before the first class the animal would be shown in. Unruly or wild animals will be sent home. An adult may assist the member with leading animals across the scale. NOSE TONGS, NOSE RINGS OR INHUMANE RESTRAINTS ARE PROHIBITED.
- **3.** Each market animal will be officially weighed once, any over or under weight animals will be re-weighed immediately upon exhibitor's request, once scales have been checked for zero and balanced. NO RE-WEIGH AFTER THIS POINT. Lambs will not be weighed wet. Wool must be 1/2" or less.
- **4.** Any animal without the proper identification (rabbits tattooed or matching photo, chickens banded or matching photo, steers ear-tagged, hogs not matching photo and sheep and goats without documented USDA scrapies tag and matching photo) will be sent home off the scale and will not be sold in the auction.
- **5.** Completed E-SLIPS and HEALTH FORMS and additional paperwork that maybe required must be turned into weigh-in clerk before weighing in. If all paperwork is not complete the animals may not be weighed.
- **6.** All animal must meet the following weight and age guidelines at Final Weigh-in: Dairy Replacement Heifers, no weight requirements. Must be 90 days pregnant. Beef 1100 lbs. minimum, no maximum, Market Sheep minimum weigh of 110 lbs, maximum 160 lbs., Market Goats minimum weight 65 lbs. maximum weight 120 lbs., Swine minimum weight of 225 lbs and maximum weight of 310 lbs. Note: No intact males allowed in the above mentioned species (including cryptorchids). Fryer Rabbits-3.5 to 5 lbs. under 69 days, Roaster Rabbits 5 to 7.5 lbs. under 90 days. Fryer Chickens- 4 to 6 lbs. under 8 weeks, Roaster Chickens over 6 lbs. 8 to 16 weeks. (Rabbits & Chickens in pens of 3).
- 7. All animals meeting weight requirements will be evaluated by a qualified judge and their decision is final. White ribbons are an indication of an estimated grade of standard or below in market animals. WHITE RIBBON ANIMALS ARE NOT ELIGIBLE TO SALE due to below standard carcass grade estimations. These animals must remain on the fairgrounds until the completion of fair. If they leave prior to the set time, all premiums will be forfeited and the student may be ineligible to exhibit at future fairs.
- **8.** Violations of the above rules will result in disqualification and forfeiture of any awards, and may result in expulsion from the fairgrounds and violator ineligibility to participate in the animal divisions in future fairs.
- **9.** Fees associated with the examination and treatment of any animal at the fair, by the fair veterinarian, are the responsibility of the animal's owner. Payment is required at the time of service. The fair board is not responsible for fees generated on sick animals. The fair veterinarian will be available at a designated period each day. See fair office for times. In emergency situations, the fair veterinarian can be contacted through the fair office.

IUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE

- **1.** The order of the sale by species will be determined by the sale committee based on quality and class ribbon. Grand and Reserve Grand Champions of each specie will sell first and second followed by ribbon placing in the ring.
- 2. Rabbit & chicken fryers and roasters will be sold in pens of three by the pen. If a floor is unavailable, the price will start at zero. Rabbits and chickens selling through the sale must go to the floor buyer.
- **3.** All animals eligible can go through the sale. Except dairy replacement heifers, all animals that go through the sale must go to slaughter at a registered slaughter facility.
- **4.** Each 4-H or FFA member shall show his/her own animals through the sales ring unless excused by a variance committee consisting of the 4-H Agent (4-H Program Assistant if 4-H Agents is not available). pecies Superintendent, FFA Advisor or two voting members of the Ir. Sales Committee.
- **5.** Consignment of livestock will be to Junior Sale Committee and sale commission charge will be deducted from the sale price of each animal in lieu of any other selling charges to offset the cost of conducting the sale.
- **6.** If the sales committee agrees to conduct a carcass contest then the carcass data will be obtained on market animals. If carcass data is not obtainable it will not be included in carcass contest.
- **7.** All exhibitors are responsible to properly care for their animals until the animal is loaded on the truck. With Dairy projects the exhibitor is responsible for all care and expenses until the heifer is delivered to the buyer. Any exhibitor not caring for their project after the sale will be charged a \$25.00/day fee and unable to sell in future sales.
- **8.** When a person purchases an animal for their own use and the carcass does not grade on the rail as estimated by the judge, it will be the purchaser's responsibility to accept the carcass as graded.
- **9.** If an animal is condemned in the slaughter process, the Jr. Sale Committee will absorb the loss, with the exception of drug residues (as referred to in Malheur County Junior Livestock Sale Committee Drug Policy) or other pre-existing conditions that were in the control of the exhibitor.
- 10. Exhibitors will be responsible for their animal until it is loaded on the trucks. Exhibitors will be encouraged to bring their animals to the designated loading areas. All pens must be cleaned after loading and the 4-H agent, 4-H Program Assistant, FFA Advisor, or Specie Superintendent must check that things are cleaned appropriately. Failure to clean stall, tack or feed areas will result in a bill.
- **11.** Animal that do not go through the auction are not the responsibility of the Sale Committee. Extra animals will not be shipped with sale animals.
- $12.\ A\ 2\%$ shrink may be taken after final weigh-in to all species for the Livestock Sale.
- 13. No member shall be permitted to decorate, paint or adorn their animal with any item except the ribbons won by that exhibitor while showing that animal. Violators will be required to remove said items and if cannot do so in time for sale they will forfeit their spot in the sale order. Anyone in violation of this rule shall have a \$500 fine removed from their livestock sale check. The check will not be released to the individual until an apology letter has been received to the Junior Livestock Sale Committee and the Malheur County Fair Board.

14. When a participant sells their market animal through the Malheur County Junior Livestock Sale and the market animal is not delivered to the floor buyer or a registered slaughter house, then the seller will receive a minimum of a one year suspension for selling through the MCJLS. All Proceeds from the sale of said animal will be returned to the purchaser(s)/buver(s).

4-H AND FFA DAIRY HEIFER REPLACEMENT RULES

The objective of this sale is to provide an outlet for quality dairy replacement heifers raised by 4-H & FFA youth enrolled in this project. These heifers were purchased as calves from local dairymen. Youth have raised these heifers for one or two years with each animal vaccinated, dewormed, dehorned and bred to quality sires.

GENERAL RULES

- 1. All dairy heifers will be pregnancy checked by a licensed veterinarian, must be at least 90 days pregnant at fair time, ear tattoo confirmed, and weighed on Tuesday, of fair week, prior to steer weigh-in at the beef scale by designated weigh master at Malheur County Fair. Health forms & E-slip needs to be turned in at weigh in. Heifer weights will be available during the sale.
- 2. Any heifer calving early still must be sold in the sale with the new calf considered separate from the heifer and owned by the 4-H/ FFA student currently raising the animal.
 - 3. The champion heifer of each breed will sell first.
- 4. The sales commission will be deducted from each check to cover expenses.
- 5. All money collected through the Junior Sale will be handled by the Junior Sale Committee and Nichols Accounting Services.

- 6. Dairy Cattle will not be pregnancy checked on the scales.
- 7. Contact the Dairy Replacement Heifer Program Committee for additional guidelines and rules.

REQUIRED DOCUMENTATION FOR ALL ANIMALS BEING SOLD THROUGH THE IUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE

1. BEEF MARKET ANIMALS—

All market steer exhibitors must turn in the following at final weigh-in at fair:

- **a. E-SLIP** Filled out by the seller of the animal.
- **b. WHITE HEALTH FORM:** Filled out completely and signed.
- 2. MARKET HOGS-

All market hog exhibitors must turn in at weigh-in at fair:

- **a. WHITE HEALTH FORM:** Filled out completely and signed.
- 3. MARKET LAMBS-

All market lamb exhibitors must turn in at final weigh-in at fair:

- **a. WHITE HEALTH FORM** Filled out completely and signed.
- 4. MARKET GOATS-

All market goat exhibitors must turn in at final weigh-in at fair:

- **a. WHITE HEALTH FORM:** Filled out completely and signed.
- 5. MARKET CHICKENS & RABBITS-

All market chickens and rabbits must turn in:

- **a. WHITE HEALTH FORM** Filled out completely and signed.
- 6. DAIRY REPLACEMENT HEIFERS-

All Dairy Replacement Heifer exhibitors must turn in at final weigh-in

- **a. E-SLIP** Filled out by the seller of the animal.
- **b. BANGS TATTOO**
- c. WHITE HEALTH FORM— Filled out completely and signed.




MALHEUR COUNTY JR. LIVESTOCK SALE COMMITTEE (MCJSC)

Drug Policy

The following practices or procedures are unacceptable and are defined as being deceptive, fraudulent, unethical and inhumane in the care, fitting, preparation and showing of all classes of livestock.

Use of any illegal drugs is prohibited. Use of illegal drugs is considered a premeditated act. THIS-IS-A-ONESTRIKE-AND-YOU-**ARE-OUT-POLICY!** Exhibitors will forfeit any premiums, awards or auction proceeds and will be prohibited from further exhibiting at the Malheur County Fair for not less than one year. Treating an animal internally or externally with any irritant, counterirritant or other substance used to artificially change the conformation or appearance of an animal for show is considered to be unethical and inhumane and is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, the use of ice, graphite, air, powders, hemp, artificial hair coloring, common products such as fly spray, ointment or liniment used to the point that it is irritating, (unless required to reduce edema at time of calving) or similar products. The use of dyes, spray paints or other artificial colorings which result in altering an animal's true and natural appearance and/or color is prohibited if done for deceptive reasons. Adding false hair or hair like material, fleece, or skin at any point, spot or area of the animal's body is prohibited and will result in immediate disqualification. Utilization of any liquid or substance not generally considered as part of an accepted and normal diet for livestock, according to their digestive system, is deemed to be illegal and inhumane. The use of tranquilizers, sedatives or depressants or any action which might alter the natural physical or physiological state of an animal is prohibited. Exceptions to this rule will be permitted only with the approval and under the direct supervision of the 4-H Superintendent for a recognized disease or injury. All drugs must be approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for use in meat-producing animals. All exhibitors must advise the 4-H Superintendent in a signed Market Health Record (white health form) concerning any drugs and/or medications administered to an animal. The name of the drug, its purpose, the person who administered the drug, time and date of administration must be presented to the 4-H Superintendent prior to the showing and sale of the animal. Failure to report this information to the 4-H Superintendent may result in severe penalty and/or disqualification. Such penalties may include revoking of premiums, fines, repayment of value of animal and the inability to sell an animal in the future. Any use of drugs or substances not approved by the Food and Drug Administration is strictly prohibited. All animals entered into livestock competition may be subject to testing for foreign substances that exceed levels established by the FDA, FSIS, USDA or EPA. Surgery and injection or insertion of foreign materials under the skin and/or into the flesh of an animal to change the natural contour, conformation or appearance of the animal's body is illegal. This prohibition includes vegetable oil, air, silicone or any other substance used

to alter the shape of the animal. Acceptable practices of physical preparation which are permitted include clipping of hair, trimming of hooves, dehorning and docking of tails. The use of inhumane fitting, showing and/or handling practices or devices will not be tolerated. For example, breaking of tails, striking animals to cause swelling or for bracing purposes, use of electrical contrivances are not acceptable and are prohibited. At the time an animal is sold at auction at the livestock show, the exhibitor will be held directly responsible for animals that are rejected at a processing center due to the presence of foreign residues. The seller may be liable to the buyer for an amount equal to the purchase price received at the Ir. Livestock Auction, MCISC directors may share intelligence and evidence and/or information with the FDA and USDA. If, for any reason, any part of a meat animal carcass must be removed by the FDA or USDA, the market price will be discounted. The MCJSC reserves the right to require market health records. Health inspections and diagnostic tests may be made before or after animals are on the livestock-show premises for exhibitor and animal safety, or to inaugurate disease-control procedures which may become necessary in emergencies as determined by animal-health officials. The MCJSC reserves the right to make selections in each division/section/class of any market animals that may be tested for zero tolerance for any undisclosed drug, chemical or feed additive immediately following the judging phase. Exhibitor, parent or legal guardian, specie superintendent and a MCJSC member must be in attendance during testing. The County Fair Veterinarian will collect all samples in a manner deemed appropriate by him or her and witnesses will initial the seal. The MCJSC reserves the right to collect tissue samples from any harvested animal sold in the sale for the purpose of testing. All test results are final. Any entry violating the Malheur County Livestock Health Requirements or the MCJSC 4-H and FFA Market Auction Sale Rules will be disqualified. No reordering of the judged ranking of the animals will take place (i.e., the Reserve Champion will not be elevated to the Grand Champion position following the disqualification of the Grand Champion). The cost of a failed drug test will be the financial responsibility of the exhibitor presenting the animal failing the test. All other drugtesting costs will be borne by the MCJSC. Ray & Anita Anthony Memorial

The family started this memorial as a tribute to a father and mother who lived for the fair and loved having opportunities for their children to be involved in youth activities. They loved people and animals and the atmosphere at the county fair. This memorial honors their energies toward those ends.

Bob Bain Memorial

The son of former Malheur County Livestock Extension Agent, George Bain, Bob is remembered for his involvement in 4-H showing quality Herefords. He was killed in an accident at a very young age.

Irene Barton Memorial

Irene Barton was a mother of four and owned the Vale Shoe Shop along with her husband, Leroy. She was involved with her church ladies group and enjoyed traveling. Irene was an active 4-H supporter and co-superintendent in the food division of the Malheur County Fair for many years.

Lorraine Boor Memorial

Lorraine moved to Ontario with her parents and brother in 1930. Several years after graduating from Ontario High School she married Bill Boor. Lorraine was a dedicated wife, mom and homemaker. As a senior citizen she enjoyed entering items in several different classes at the fair. Her favorite was the sourdough class in the food division. Her hope was that her participation through the years would encourage others to enter

items in the fair. Lorraine last entered exhibits at the fair at age 86 and came home with many ribbons.

Maag Brother's Beef Arena

The Maag Brothers-Emil, Warner and Benny- moved to Malheur County in 1938 and settled in the Jamieson area where their descendants are still involved in farming and the cattle industry. The Maag Brothers were proud supporters of the fair and the fat stock sale for decades. Their hope was that the beef arena would help local youth to develop and show premium livestock. These young people are the future of agriculture and are our ambassadors.

Nancy Bracht Memorial

Nancy Bracht began quilting after her retirement in 1995. She loved to hand and machine piece quilt tops, but her greatest love was handquilting. She finished between three and four quilts every year, most of them handquilted. She was a member of the Treasure Valley Quiltmakers and won many awards throughout the valley for her beautiful handquilting.

Debbie Edmonson Memorial

Debbie grew up in Ontario and is remembered for her involvement in the 4-H program especially showing quality Angus cattle. She died very young in an accident.

Kara Hawkins Memorial

This memorial honors Kara

Hawkins, a Vale resident, who fought a courageous battle with cancer during her middle school years. She loved showing Angus cattle and attending the county fair. This hard luck trophy was established to help other youth be strong throughout the unexpected potholes in life.

Lewis and Roselind Iohnson Memorial

Lewis and Roselind Johnson came to the Treasure Valley in the early 1940s establishing the Lew-Rose Dairy near Vale. They owned and operated a Jersey dairy with an outstanding line of Jersey cattle. In addition, they were known for their involvement in the beef cattle industry. Their children were all raised and educated in Vale. Many of them continue to live here, contributing to their community as Lew and Roselind did.

Linda Leininger Memorial

Growing up in the Malheur County 4-H program, Linda gave back to hundreds of youth through her loving ways as a teacher and as a 4-H horse leader. Taken by cancer at an early age, Linda will always be remembered for her positive nature and can-do attitude.

Mandy Palmer Memorial

Mandy Palmer was a 10-year 4-H member and active Ontario FFA member. She is best remembered for her love of dairy animals, her quiet manner and generous nature. She died as a result of an accident near Ontario.

Leonard F. Sherman DVM Memorial

Dr. Sherman was the Malheur County Fair veterinarian for many years, dedicating hundreds of hours to keeping the livestock and horse exhibits healthy. He helped establish the pet show to encourage more children to participate in fair activities. He also helped develop the Bid/Price calculator used for the Junior Livestock auction to help buyers. His family members continue to be actively involved in many fair activities.

Ryan Singleton Memorial

Ryan was an active teenager at the time of his death. He was a member of the Willowcreek Livestock 4-H Club enjoying showing and selling market lambs. He is remembered for loving competition, whether in a game or in the show ring.

Gilbert and Nellie Sproul Memorial

This award honors top dairymen from the Ontario area. Gilbert had quality Guernsey cattle and was known across the region for his superior cattle. He was very involved with the 4-H program and assisted many youth with their dairy projects.

The Will Tiffany Arena

Will served on the Fair Board for 20 years, and counted the construction of the Rodeo Arena as his proudest accomplishment. Where once was an obsolete race track, now thousands of people annually enjoy arena events. After his passing in 2021, the area was renamed in his honor.



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
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
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
