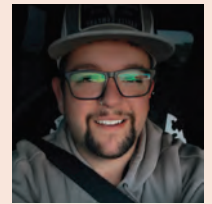

Olivia Harms & the Roadrunners

Saturday, August 1, 8:30 pm

Olivia Harms was born Western Music royalty, but the rhinestone cowgirl has stepped out on her own to craft a sound that is equal parts Texas, Bakersfield, and Nashville country.

The daughter of Western Music Hall of Fame member Joni Harms, Olivia grew up on a 150-year-old ranch in Canby, OR, and made her first appearance on stage when she was two days old. Her mother had labor induced so she wouldn't miss her show. Twenty-seven years later, Olivia is following in her mother's creative footsteps and basing herself out of Granbury, TX.

Olivia's second album "Rhinestone Cowgirl" was released in 2021. Produced by D. Scott Miller and recorded in Nashville, the 11-song collection calls out to the cowboys, name-drops George Strait, swings through Buckaroo territory and packs plenty of twang and steel guitar. Olivia co-wrote every song. "I was going for a very traditional country vibe, but with some Bakersfield style country-western swing to bring back honky-tonks." Olivia explained.

Her artistic identity has been honed since she was an infant. The singer grew up performing on stages all over the world with her mother. Olivia remembers yodeling in Europe and singing "I Want to Be a Cowboy's Sweetheart" in New Zealand. When she was 6 years old, Santa Claus delivered her first guitar and sparked her love of songwriting. Ten years later, at 16 years old, Olivia went to Nashville to record her first album.

After high school Olivia went to Oregon State University while further pursuing her music career, and her second passion of agriculture. She graduated college with a degree in agriculture business management and cattle production, then she dove headfirst into the music business. Olivia books her own shows, handles public relations, and manages all her social media accounts in addition to writing, recording and playing more than 200 shows a year. "I try to be a real one-woman show" she said.

When Olivia was ready to record her second album. She wrote songs with noted country writers including Wood Newton (The Oak Ridge Boys "Bobbie Sue," Kenny Rogers "20 Years Ago") and Dennis Morgan (Barbara Mandrell "I Was Country When Country Wasn't Cool," Ronnie Milsap "Smoky Mountain Rain.") From



her autobiographical "Gypsy" to the lighthearted "Hey There Cowboy" and the deeply personal "Goodbye," "Rhinestone Cowgirl" is Olivia Harms.

After the release of her second album in 2021 Olivia was ready to hit the ground running after her dreams. She has since relocated to Texas and has released two singles to Texas Red Dirt Radio. Her first single, "Neon Blue," peaked at #29 on the Texas Top 100 Chart. Her highly anticipated second release, "Hey There Cowboy" debuted on the Texas Top 100 Chart after only 3 weeks and is on the rise!

Olivia has found her niche genre, playing music for western lifestyle and honky-tonk lovers. She has been recognized for her hard work and perseverance to stay true to herself

and play music that is authentic to her. In March of 2022 Olivia was honored to be in COWGIRL Magazines third class of "30 Under 30", a gala hosted at The Drover Hotel in the Fort Worth Stockyards highlighting 30 western women under 30 years old that are making a difference in the western industry. Olivia was honored again in June of 2022 to be announced as "Singer of The Year" at the First Annual Women of The West Gala at the Cowgirl Hall of Fame Museum in Fort Worth, TX.

These days, Olivia spends the majority of her time touring Texas and the surrounding areas, returning to the northwest for tours in the summer and winter. Regardless of where she hangs her hat, she's well in touch with her western roots.

Northern Cali raised with a conscious spin, Matthew Balling's music reflects his Sacramento Valley, Bay roots, and Foothill upbringings. Story telling with a strong message, organic lyricism from the heart is what you'll find in his music. Matthew was raised by his mother who is a painter. Matthew took up painting, and does that on the side. Painting is something that has helped him in graphic design, making his own clothes, and editing his music video's. Matthew spends a lot of his time on the engineering side, recording and mixing other artist's music as he runs two studio's.

One of his studio's offers recording time and mixing lessons for teen's and young adults in the community, coming out of juvenile hall, also serving kids in group homes and foster

care. The studio is called the i 4 C music program (Influencers 4 Change - Collectively Cultivating Change through Consistent relationship building).

Musically Matthew started in church, singing worship songs, until his roommate gave him beats that he sung choir songs too, which led to writing his first raps.

Matthew has produced many albums. His latest "Family (Story Times, Stormy Times)" is streaming on platforms, and he is currently working on 2 EP's. One, he's excited to announce because it's a new endeavor.

Do not use candy, paper, paints, crayons, store bought materials, fabric or commercially processed foods etc. You may use toothpicks to keep your project together, but are not to be part of the decoration. Ontario Saturday Market will provide produce and supplies.

The Fair and Ontario Saturday Market are not responsible for any decorations— entries must be picked up at end of fair as stated in the fair book, or will be disposed of.

2026 MALHEUR COUNTY FAIR General Rules



The general supervision of the grounds and entire exhibition, the police regulations and entrance gates are vested in the Malheur County Fair Board. The Fair Association reserves to its Board of Directors the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, and to add to and amend these rules as they deem advisable.

1. No Entry Clerk shall, under any circumstances, allow the entry books of the association to go from their possession, or to be inspected by anyone except the officers or appointees of the association, nor shall any entry be made known by the clerk until the entries are closed and the entry books placed at the hands of the Superintendent of the proper department. Any exhibitor found examining the entry books will forfeit all premiums or money won.

2. Exhibits shipped to the Fair should be addressed in care of the Malheur County Fair Board, 795 N.W. 9th St., Ontario, OR 97914. They must be sent prepaid as the association will not be liable for express or freight charges. In every instance, exhibits must be brought at the risk of the exhibitor or owner.

3. Open class livestock exhibits must have been owned by exhibitors at least two weeks prior to the Fair and land products must have been grown or produced by the exhibitor.

4. All livestock entries must be entered for competition in the name of the bona-fide owner. Animal's registration number must be entered on the entry card. Persons trying to deceive the committee in regard to ownership of animals, or who shall purchase or borrow and then exhibit them as their own raising shall forfeit all claims to premiums. Registration ear tags must match registration papers and will be checked by the Superintendent.

5. The Association will take reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of exhibits sent to the exhibition, but the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them. Should any exhibit or portion thereof

be injured, burned, lost, or stolen, the association will give assistance towards recovery of the same but will not be liable to make payment for the value thereof.

6. Exhibitors of animals, machinery in motion and other exhibits liable to occasional accidents, injury or damage to persons coming in contact with them shall guard their exhibits and protect the public coming in contact therewith. Every exhibitor, by exhibiting during the Fair, agrees that they will indemnify the Association from and against any claim or demand, cost, charges and expenses which the Association may incur, suffer or be put to by reason of any accident or any person being injured or suffering damage through or by reason of such exhibit not being properly guarded or the public not being protected therefrom. That he will, upon demand, reimburse the Fair Association for any such sums it may have been compelled to expend by reason of such claims, expenses or charges.

7. If any exhibit is entered in the wrong class, an effort to correct the mistake will be made, providing it is discovered before the awards are made. Where an error has been made by clerks or the judges, the same shall be settled by the Malheur County Fair Board upon satisfactory proof that such error was made.

8. In all cases the right is reserved to reject or accept conditionally, any entry or application at any time at the discretion of the Board.

9. Exhibits must not be removed before Sunday, August 2, 2026

10. All entries must be entered and released in accordance with the rules in their respective divisions. Check Schedule of Events for entry & release time for all exhibits.

11. Fair officially opens at 2 p.m. Tuesday and at 8 a.m. daily Wednesday through Saturday. **Commercial Building** is closed Tuesday, open noon to 9 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday, and 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. Friday and Saturday. **Red Barn** opens 4 p.m. Tuesday and 11 a.m. Wednesday through Saturday 10 a.m. Red Barn closes every day at 10 p.m.

12. No bikes, skateboards, scooters, or motorcycles are allowed around on the grounds. Horses are to be kept in Grandstand area only. **No dogs or domestic pets allowed on fairgrounds other than show exhibitors.**

13. Cars parked in unauthorized areas and fire lanes will be towed away at the owner's expense.

14. No illegal drugs will be allowed on the Fairgrounds.

15. All alcoholic beverages on the grounds are to be in designated areas. Minors in possession will be charged on the Fairgrounds by Ontario City Police and/or Malheur County Sheriff. In addition, any exhibitor who is a minor found in possession of or under the influence of alcohol or drugs, or caught vandalizing, the Ontario City Police and/or Malheur County Sheriff will be notified and will be subject to immediate expulsion from the fair. If said exhibitor is a 4-H or FFA member who will be selling an animal at the market sale, no premium money will be awarded nor the sale of the animal allowed.

16. All gates will be closed at midnight. Exhibitors extremely late to their tents or campers after curfew without prior approval from the adult responsible and security will be reported to the grievance committee. All campers will be in their camping area and quiet by curfew.

17. Any premiums not picked up from the Fair Office by Sept 1, 2026, will be forfeited and returned to the Fair.

18. All animals to be placed in competition at the Malheur County Fair must be pre-registered to insure stall space. Livestock entry forms are available in the book and at the Fair Office and are due July 1.

19. Crossover exhibits from 4-H and/or FFA to Open Class will not be allowed.

20. It is understood that the act of entering an exhibit or contest at the Malheur County Fair is asking the Fair Management to secure a qualified judge to place a judgment on the exhibit or performance. It is therefore courteous to gracefully accept the decision of the judge realizing that it may be in conflict with your ►

set of standards. Every reasonable effort will be made to secure highly qualified and conscientious judges. If you feel you are not willing to accept this judgment, please write "exhibit only" on your entry. The decision of the judge is final. Any concerns must be directed to the Superintendent of the Division.

VEHICLE and FOOT TRAFFIC INFORMATION

Fire lanes must be maintained throughout the grounds, throughout Fair. The Archway Gate into the Fairgrounds will be closed to all vehicles Monday after 7 p.m. through Saturday of Fair week. This is also a safety measure for foot traffic. There are two other entrances for vehicles into the grounds. The South Gate gives access to the south half of the facility and the parking lot west of the livestock barns and is to be used for admittance of livestock exhibitors only. The West Gate, off Park Avenue, gives access to the Horse Barns. Daily deliveries inside the Fairgrounds must be made before 9 a.m. through the West gate only.

Fair Board and Fair Board Designees are the only individuals that are permitted to use an ATV on the fairgrounds during the open hours.

EXHIBITORS:

Trucks and/or horse trailers are to be parked at the NE corner of the facility, unless otherwise posted.

Trucks and/or horse trailers are not permitted in the camping area.

OVERNIGHT CAMPING

All campers are required to purchase a camping permit. Tent camping is \$30 per week. RV's with electricity is \$175 per week. RV's with no power is \$100 per week. Only 1 vehicle per Camping space will be permitted. This vehicle must have a "Camper's Parking Pass" prominently displayed.

Each camper will register at the Fair Office and turn in written parental permission, the name of the adult in charge of the tent or camper and list of the occupants, and display a registration card of each occupant in

a visible place designated by the Fair Board.

One adult shall be responsible for each tent or camper. All campers are required to register and display a registration card. All campers will be in their camping area and quiet by curfew. The Fair Board appreciates the cooperation of everyone in keeping the grounds safe and orderly. If there are campers that cannot afford the camping fees, please let the fair office know and arrangements will be made.

PAYMENT OF AWARDS

Fabric ribbons will be given (at time of judging) in some Fair divisions. Other divisions will have placing stickers attached to the entry tags and fabric ribbons will be given with premium money.

In Open Class Departments:

Blue: First place, \$3

Red: Second place, \$2

White: Third place, \$1

Special awards are listed in each division.

Exhibitors are limited to one entry per section for judging:

Judges will determine entry quality.

4-H, FFA and Open Class Departments included.

All awards for which cash prizes are awarded will be paid by cash or check.

4-H premiums will be available at the 4-H office. FFA premiums will be handed out by the FFA Advisors. Open class premiums can be obtained on the Monday after fair week from 12 noon - 4 pm in the Fair office.

Release time for exhibits:

8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Sunday following fair.

All decisions by the judges hired are final.

The Malheur County Fair is an open show and exhibitors out of the county and state are welcome to enter in all open classes. If funds are available, payment of premiums will be made in full amounts as listed; however, the Fair Board reserves the right to prorate premium money in the event there are insufficient funds to pay the full premiums awarded by the judges.

MALHEUR COUNTY FAIR BOARD ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY

The Malheur County Fair Board will maintain compliance with all applicable federal, state and local environmental laws, ordinances and regulations. The Policy of the Fair Board is to adhere to the Oregon State Department of Agriculture regulations pertaining to agriculture and environmental concerns.

To prevent the transmission of enteric pathogens and other transmittable diseases including E.coli, the Malheur County Fair Board will ask fairgoers to wash their hands immediately upon leaving the barns.

Food and beverage is discouraged in the barns. The Fair board will have hand washing stations near the barns. There will be signs reminding fairgoers to wash their hands and not eat food in the barns.

ITEMS PROHIBITED ON FAIRGROUNDS

The following items are prohibited on the property owned or controlled ("Fairgrounds") by the Malheur County Fair Board, unless specifically authorized by the Board:

- a. Bicycles, skateboards, roller blades, scooters: unlocked heelies;
- b. Unauthorized vehicles;
- c. Unauthorized animals, reptiles, insects, arachnids, and other pets;
- d. Weapons;
- e. Fireworks, explosives or explosive devices, and inflammables;
- f. Alcohol or alcoholic beverages outside of designated areas;
- g. Attire, costume, clothing or accessories in which, based on the training and experience of a law enforcement officer or the Director, can be articulated as being affiliated with an established criminal gang;
- h. Controlled substances, ie. marijuana;
- i. Any other object or objects which in the opinion of the Fair Board Director or his/her designee may affect the safety and well-being of persons attending events at the fairgrounds.



LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS: 4-H, FFA, OPEN

All animals and poultry will be given a clinical examination by a veterinarian on arrival to the fairgrounds. No animal from a quarantined herd will be admitted. All animals are subject to examination from veterinarian at any time on the fairgrounds. No animal will be admitted or allowed to stay that shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease, or any unsightly condition (such as ringworm, pink eye, sore mouth or malnutrition). Fair management reserves the right to require health inspections, diagnostic tests, treatments and/or other animal health measures or procedures which might become necessary in emergencies.

All poultry will be blood tested for Pullorum Typhoid disease by Oregon Department of Ag officials.

All sheep will have a Scrapie tag from the USDA.

All Goats will have a registration tattoo or a Scrapie tag from the USDA.

All heifer cattle older than 4 months of age must be brucellosis vaccinated with an official ID and tattoo present.

All animals from Idaho will require an Idaho Health Certificate.

MEDICATION AND CHEMICAL RESIDUE AVOIDANCE

The Malheur County Fair Board is concerned that all meat and milk products marketed from fair animals be free from illegal and unethical drugs and chemicals. The following rules are adopted to prevent drug residues and pertain to all livestock, horses and small animals exhibited at the Fair.

1. No drug, chemical, or feed additive shall be administered to any animal on the Fairgrounds during the Malheur County Fair without the approval of the Fair Manager, Fair Veterinarian or a person designated by the manager. Administration of drugs or chemicals requires that the exhibitor file a "Drug Administration Form" with the Fair office. Administration of any drugs or chemicals on the fairgrounds must be witnessed by the superintendent of the division or the Fair Veterinarian.

2. All market animals and producing dairy animal exhibitors and their parent/guardian are required to sign a disclosure statement on the official health form disclosing all drugs, chemicals and feed additives used in or on the animal for the entire feeding period.

3. All market animals must meet all withdrawal requirements to enter the sale. Market animals shall not contain any identifiable or unidentifiable foreign substance including: drugs, steroids, herbs, or chemicals; greater than those allowed by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for the sale of consumption as human food during the time the animal is on the fairgrounds. Test samples collected from 4-H and FFA animals shall be free of any foreign substance, including but not limited to steroids, drugs or chemicals affecting the central nervous system (for example: stimulants, depressants or painkillers).

4. All exhibitors (open, 4-H and FFA) must complete an official health form for each animal exhibited. Exhibitor and parent/guardian (if exhibitor is under the age of 18) must sign an agreement to permit animals to be tested for drugs, chemicals and feed additives.

5. The Malheur County Fair Board reserves the right to test any animal exhibit for tampering, altering, misrepresentation, unethical fitting, natural or foreign substance, to include drugs, blood, oil, steroids, or chemicals. The submission of any 4-H, open class or FFA entry into the Malheur County Fair expressly grants the Fair Board the right to conduct such tests. Such tests may include laboratory analysis of saliva, urine, blood or other substances. Refusing tests will result in disqualification, forfeiture of awards and possibly expulsion.

6. Violations of the above rules will result in disqualification and forfeiture of any awards, and may result in expulsion from the fairgrounds and violator ineligibility to participate in the animal divisions in future fairs.

7. Fees associated with the examination and treatment of any animal at the fair, by the fair veterinarian, are the responsibility of the animal's owner. Payment is required at the time of service. The Fair Board is not responsible for fees generated on sick animals. The fair veterinarian will be available at a designated period each day. See the fair office for times. In emergency situations, the fair veterinarian can be contacted through the fair office.

OUT-OF-STATE ORIGIN

All out of state entries to the fairgrounds must have an official certificate of inspection from an accredited veterinarian to present at entry on the grounds. All out of state entry requirements must be met for this certificate of inspection. The current requirements can be found at www.oregon.gov under the animal export and import requirements page.

Cattle

All out of state dairy cattle older than 2 months of age must be tuberculosis tested.

Swine

Proof of vaccination for leptospirosis and erysipelas must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. A statement is also required that pseudorabies vaccine has not been performed.

Sheep

All sheep will be inspected for any indications of Blue Tongue, Contagious Ecthyma (sore mouth), foot rot, sore sheath or any other contagious or infectious disease. All sheep exhibited will have USDA scrapie eartag.

Goats

All dairy goats over six (6) months of age must be brucellosis tested and negative within thirty (30) days prior to entry into Oregon. All goats will have a USDA flock # and scrapie eartag or registration tattoo.

Poultry - Pigeons - Rabbits - Cavies

No animal shall be admitted or allowed to remain on the grounds that shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease or any unsightly condition. Birds or animals should not be vaccinated with live Newcastle disease (Pneumoencephalitis) virus vaccine or any other live virus vaccine within 45 days prior to entry to Fairgrounds. Rabbits will be checked for ear mites before entering.

All poultry, including turkeys, must originate from flocks under supervision of the National Poultry Improvement Plan or the entire flock of origin must be tested and found free of Pullorum-Typhoid disease within the past thirty (30) days preceding entry to Oregon.

Horses

All out of state horses are required to have a current negative Coggins test.

ANIMAL WELFARE POLICY Oregon Fairs Association

The fitting and showing of livestock are traditional hallmarks of Oregon's fair industry as are rodeos and horse racing. Each year, tens of thousands of 4-H and FFA members, as well as adults, actively participate in competitions involving cattle, horses, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens, ducks, geese, llamas, rabbits, hamsters, guinea pigs, dogs and other animals.

Considering the importance of animals to Oregon fairs, it shall be the policy of members of the Oregon Fairs Association to treat all animals at the fair in a humane manner. Animals shall be provided clean bedding, adequate food and water, and fair exhibitors shall keep their animals from harm. It shall further be the policy of OFA members to protect animals from mistreatment by the general public and to assure the safety of fair patrons. Persons in charge of fair activities involving animals shall be made aware of this policy. (OFA 10/88)

3. Red Barn Supervisors, Division Superintendents and the Fair Board reserve the right to exclude exhibits.

The Professional Category in any division does not have an age classification. Professionals are defined as:

Anyone who produces items for sale in shops, does custom work for hire, is an instructor or advertises as a business.

Business cards can be displayed with exhibits **after** the judging is complete.

OPEN CLASS Livestock Division



Fees associated with the examination and treatment of any animal at the fair by the fair veterinarian are the responsibility of the animal's owner. Payment is required at the time of service. The Fair Board is not responsible for fees generated on sick animals. The fair veterinarian will be available at a designated period each day. See the fair office for times. In emergency situations, the fair veterinarian can be contacted through the fair office.

GENERAL RULES

1. Pre-registration. In order to ensure adequate stall space, it will be necessary to pre-register all animals on or before **July 1**. This may be done by mailing the necessary information to the Malheur County Fair Board Office, 795 NW 9th Street, Ontario, OR 97914.

Application for entry into any classes not requiring pedigree must bear date of birth, or age of animal, sex, breed, and ear tag or tattoo number. Animals competing in these classes shall be true to breed type, and if not, may at the discretion of judges, be eliminated from competition.

Any animal arriving at the Fairgrounds that is not pre-registered will be assigned space only in the event that vacant space exists over and above the assigned pre-registered livestock.

Pre-registration: \$5.00 per animal

2. Crossover exhibits will NO LONGER be allowed from 4-H and/or FFA into the Open Class division.

3. Registration Day. Upon arrival at the Fairgrounds, submit health certificate and, in the case of registered animals, registry papers, at the Open Class Office before unloading. **A Health Information Form will be provided by exhibitor on each animal and filed with the Fair Office.**

4. Straw/shavings will be used for bedding material in all livestock barns. Straw/shavings will be kept in designated areas on the grounds and exhibitors will be responsible for getting it to the area of use. Exhibitors must furnish own equipment, such as wheelbarrows, pitchforks, etc. Vehicles will not be allowed in livestock area after 9 A.M. each morning. **Shavings will be used in the swine barn and the small animal barn.**

5. Care of Animals. Each exhibitor will be expected to care for their own animals. If unable to do so, exhibitor must arrange for someone to take care of their animals. Unattended animals may result in disqualification. Stalls must be kept safe and clean at all times.

6. All animals entered must be in place not later than **7 p.m., Saturday, July 28th**. Request special dispensation for other times.

7. Animals competing in Get of Sire or Produce of Dam classes need not be the property of a single owner or members of his immediate family.

8. The superintendent shall exclude stock from competition, should there be any unnecessary delay on the part of the exhibitor in bringing the stock into the show ring. When on exhibit in ring, each animal must be attended and kept under control at all times. **Bulls, 6 months and over, are required to have a ring in the nose and must be shown with staff and other**

safety equipment. Any animal that seems dangerous may be disqualified. All competing animals will be exhibited and paraded at the discretion of the Superintendent of that livestock division.

9. No animal shall be decorated with any unnecessary trappings, nor shall any ribbon previously won be placed upon the animal until after the judges have made their award. During the awarding of the premiums, the exhibitors shall remain with their entries, but are in no instance allowed to comment upon the exhibit in question before the judges.

10. Washing of animals must be done on wash rack.

11. All livestock exhibitors will remove all bedding material from the stall, cleaned down to the concrete or dirt, before leaving the Fairgrounds. All bedding material is to be placed in designated dump areas.

12. All Beef and Dairy animals will have a neck rope or chain with a lead tied to the manger in addition to a halter. This neck rope or chain shall be used at all times while in the barns.

13. All animals being exhibited at the fair must pass a health check by the Fair veterinarian prior to being unloaded and stalled at the fair. These are the established times for vet checks: Monday: Horses—9 a.m. to 11 a.m. Tuesday: Small Animals—7-10 a.m.; Swine—7-10 a.m.; Goats—10 a.m. to 12 p.m.; Dairy—4-7 p.m.; Sheep—10-12 p.m.; Beef—4-7 p.m.; Dogs—TBD.

14. Horses will enter at west gate. ALL other animals will enter through the south gate.

15. Open Class market animals are not allowed to be sold through the Junior Sales Committee Auction.

16. No animals to be unattended or tied to the show ring inside or out at any time.

17. No animals to be left unattended inside or outside of the show ring at any time.

Market & Dairy Heifer Replacement Junior Livestock Auction Rules



The objective of this sale is to provide an outlet for market stock and dairy breeding animals raised in the 4-H and FFA projects. This sale is part of the consumer education efforts of 4-H and FFA with focus on marketing at proper weight, quality grade and producing a desirable carcass or breeding animal from the consumer and producer standpoint.

GENERAL RULES

1. An auction of market animals and dairy breeding stock meeting the specification outlined in these guidelines and exhibited at the Malheur County Fair will sell at the Junior Livestock Auction occurring during the fair.

2. Treating an animal internally or externally in any way to misrepresent the true nature of an animal is prohibited. The use of dyes and spray paint or other artificial means which result in altering the animal's true and natural color is not allowed. Violations of these rules may result in the member being banned from future sales and all awards, premiums and sale proceeds being withheld. Acceptable practices of physical preparation include: clipping of hair or fleece, trimming of hooves, dehorning, and removal of ancillary teats and docking of tails.

3. The use of drugs, off label or illegal, or any herbal formula on market animals or dairy breeding stock sold through auction is not allowed. Evidence of such will disqualify the exhibitor from the show, sale, and premiums. Any carcasses found positive for drug residues will be the responsibility of the exhibitor and they must forfeit market sales receipts back to the sale committee. Random drug testing of any animal may occur.

4. 4-H and FFA members must adhere to livestock health requirements set by the Malheur County Fair Board.

5. All animals sold need to be entered and shown by the owner of the animal in the market classes. In order to be eligible to sell, a student must exhibit in the showmanship class of the species they entered and intended to sell. Animals not shown by the member owning the animals will not be sold.

6. Any market animal injured at home or en route to fairgrounds will not be weighed and will not be eligible to show even in showmanship and will be sent home. Any animal injured at the fairgrounds will be assessed by the superintendent, fair veterinarian and sale committee to decide whether it can be shown.

7. Animals which have been previously sold through a finished market animal sale connected with a fair or livestock show are not eligible for exhibition.

8. Thank you notes to all buyers and anyone who may add-on or bump up the price of animals are required by all youth selling in the sale. Checks will not be released until buyers thank you notes are turned in.

9. All 4-H/FFA members planning to participate in the MCJLS and sell an animal (except dairy heifers) are required to sign and submit the Market Animal Memorandum of Understanding. This memorandum must be signed to sell a market animal. This also includes all back up animals.

SPRING WEIGH-IN

1. All animals in the market animal program must have been owned and in the possession of 4-H club or FFA chapter members by the official weigh-in or possession date. All required paperwork related to transfer of ownership is required at spring weigh-in.

2. All market beef must be dehorned and males must be castrated or banded prior to spring weigh-in. All market hogs must be castrated prior to possession date. All market lambs must be USDA scrapie tagged, castrated or banded prior to possession date or spring weigh-in. All market goats must be USDA scrapie tagged, castrated one week or banded prior to possession date or spring weigh-in.

3. All animals must meet the following weight guidelines at spring weigh-in; BEEF- 950 pound maximum; GOAT- Must still be showing milk teeth at weigh-in. No weigh requirements for other species.

4. Youth may tag one dairy heifer, two steers, two hogs, two goats, two lambs, two pens of roaster and fryer rabbits and two pens of roaster and fryer chickens. **ONLY ONE MARKET ANIMAL IN EACH DIVISION MAY BE SHOWN.** An exhibitor may sell only one animal or pen regardless of the number of projects exhibited at the fair.

5. A family unit may tag an extra animal in each species for use by a member of that immediate (i.e. brother, sister, step-sibling or living in the household during the time of the project) family and a specific exhibitors name does not have to be registered at the time of spring weigh-in. (EXAMPLE: Three kids in family unit tag one market steer each; the family unit may tag an extra steer to be designated as the FAMILY EXTRA, so each kid does not have to tag two steers. Any of these three kids could choose to use the FAMILY EXTRA steer.)

6. Steers will be ear-tagged at weigh-ins. Pens of rabbits (3 or 4 animals) and chickens (3 or 4 animals) will be visibly photographed in cage next to owner. Hogs photographed with one hog per photo. There will be four sides submitted per hog with one picture including the owner. Sheep and goats will have USDA scrapie's tag documented at the time of possession date. Photographs submitted on sheep and goats will include the scrapie's tag in the animal's ear and the animal with the owner. This includes all back-up animals that may be used as replacements at time of fair. All photographs must be submitted by the possession date pertaining to each species.

7. Allowable breeds to be sold in the Junior Livestock Sale: Goats-Boer, Kiko, Spanish/Boer, Savanna or Cross Breeds of these Breeds. Poultry-Cornish Cross, Jersey Giants, Bresse, Freedom Ranger, Red Ranger, Rolins. Rabbits-New Zealand, American, Californian, Blanc de Hotot, American Chinchilla, Silver Fox, Champagne, Cinnamons, Satins, Standard Rex, Palomino, Flemish Giants, American Sable or Cross Breeds of the above. Sheep-Cheviot, Dorset, Hampshire, Montadale, North County Cheviot, Katahdin, Oxford, Shropshire, Southdown, Suffolk, Texel, Blue Texel, Tunis, Leicester, Dorper or Cross Breeds of the above. Hogs-American Yorkshire, Berkshire, Chester White, Duroc, Hampshire, Hereford, Landrace, Poland China, Spotted, Tamworth or Cross Breeds of the above.

FAIR WEIGH-IN

1. All 4-H and FFA market animals must be weighed at scheduled spring weigh-ins in order to exhibit at fair and sell in the sale. All animals must be in place by 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday of fair.

2. Unruly animals that cannot be handled by the exhibitor will be evaluated by a variance committee consisting of the 4-H Agent (4-H Extension representation if 4-H Agent is not available), Species Superintendent, FFA Advisor and two voting members of the Jr. Sale Committee. Determination will be made before the first class the animal would be shown in. Unruly or wild animals will be sent home. An adult may assist the member with leading animals across the scale. NOSE TONGS, NOSE RINGS OR INHUMANE RESTRAINTS ARE PROHIBITED.

3. Each market animal will be officially weighed once, any over or under weight animals will be re-weighed immediately upon exhibitor's request, once scales have been checked for zero and balanced. NO RE-WEIGH AFTER THIS POINT. Lambs will not be weighed wet. Wool must be 1/2" or less.

4. Any animal without the proper identification (rabbits tattooed or matching photo, chickens banded or matching photo, steers ear-tagged, hogs not matching photo and sheep and goats without documented USDA scrapies tag and matching photo) will be sent home off the scale and will not be sold in the auction.

5. Completed E-SLIPS and HEALTH FORMS and additional paperwork that maybe required must be turned into weigh-in clerk before weighing in. If all paperwork is not complete the animals may not be weighed.

6. All animal must meet the following weight and age guidelines at Final Weigh-in: Dairy Replacement Heifers, no weight requirements. Must be 90 days pregnant. Beef 1100 lbs. minimum, no maximum, Market Sheep minimum weigh of 110 lbs, maximum 160 lbs., Market Goats minimum weight 65 lbs. maximum weight 120 lbs., Swine minimum weight of 225 lbs and maximum weight of 310 lbs. Note: No intact males allowed in the above mentioned species (including cryptorchids). Fryer Rabbits-3.5 to 5 lbs. under 69 days, Roaster Rabbits 5 to 7.5 lbs. under 90 days. Fryer Chickens- 4 to 6 lbs. under 8 weeks, Roaster Chickens over 6 lbs. 8 to 16 weeks. (Rabbits & Chickens in pens of 3).

7. All animals meeting weight requirements will be evaluated by a qualified judge and their decision is final. White ribbons are an indication of an estimated grade of standard or below in market animals. WHITE RIBBON ANIMALS ARE NOT ELIGIBLE TO SALE due to below standard carcass grade estimations. These animals must remain on the fairgrounds until the completion of fair. If they leave prior to the set time, all premiums will be forfeited and the student may be ineligible to exhibit at future fairs.

8. Violations of the above rules will result in disqualification and forfeiture of any awards, and may result in expulsion from the fairgrounds and violator ineligibility to participate in the animal divisions in future fairs.

9. Fees associated with the examination and treatment of any animal at the fair, by the fair veterinarian, are the responsibility of the animal's owner. Payment is required at the time of service. The fair board is not responsible for fees generated on sick animals. The fair veterinarian will be available at a designated period each day. See fair office for times. In emergency situations, the fair veterinarian can be contacted through the fair office.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE

1. The order of the sale by species will be determined by the sale committee based on quality and class ribbon. Grand and Reserve Grand Champions of each specie will sell first and second followed by ribbon

placing in the ring.

2. Rabbit & chicken fryers and roasters will be sold in pens of three by the pen. If a floor is unavailable, the price will start at zero. Rabbits and chickens selling through the sale must go to the floor buyer.

3. All animals eligible can go through the sale. Except dairy replacement heifers, all animals that go through the sale must go to slaughter at a registered slaughter facility.

4. Each 4-H or FFA member shall show his/her own animals through the sales ring unless excused by a variance committee consisting of the 4-H Agent (4-H Program Assistant if 4-H Agents is not available). pecies Superintendent, FFA Advisor or two voting members of the Jr. Sales Committee.

5. Consignment of livestock will be to Junior Sale Committee and sale commission charge will be deducted from the sale price of each animal in lieu of any other selling charges to offset the cost of conducting the sale.

6. If the sales committee agrees to conduct a carcass contest then the carcass data will be obtained on market animals. If carcass data is not obtainable it will not be included in carcass contest.

7. All exhibitors are responsible to properly care for their animals until the animal is loaded on the truck. With Dairy projects the exhibitor is responsible for all care and expenses until the heifer is delivered to the buyer. Any exhibitor not caring for their project after the sale will be charged a \$25.00/day fee and unable to sell in future sales.

8. When a person purchases an animal for their own use and the carcass does not grade on the rail as estimated by the judge, it will be the purchaser's responsibility to accept the carcass as graded.

9. If an animal is condemned in the slaughter process, the Jr. Sale Committee will absorb the loss, with the exception of drug residues (as referred to in Malheur County Junior Livestock Sale Committee Drug Policy) or other pre-existing conditions that were in the control of the exhibitor.

10. Exhibitors will be responsible for their animal until it is loaded on the trucks. Exhibitors will be encouraged to bring their animals to the designated loading areas. All pens must be cleaned after loading and the 4-H agent, 4-H Program Assistant, FFA Advisor, or Specie Superintendent must check that things are cleaned appropriately. Failure to clean stall, tack or feed areas will result in a bill.

11. Animal that do not go through the auction are not the responsibility of the Sale Committee. Extra animals will not be shipped with sale animals.

12. A 2% shrink may be taken after final weigh-in to all species for the Livestock Sale.

13. No member shall be permitted to decorate, paint or adorn their animal with any item except the ribbons won by that exhibitor while showing that animal. Violators will be required to remove said items and if cannot do so in time for sale they will forfeit their spot in the sale order. Anyone in violation of this rule shall have a \$500 fine removed from their livestock sale check. The check will not be released to the individual until an apology letter has been received to the Junior Livestock Sale Committee and the Malheur County Fair Board.

14. When a participant sells their market animal through the Malheur County Junior Livestock Sale and the market animal is not delivered to the floor buyer or a registered slaughter house, then the seller will receive a minimum of a one year suspension for selling through the MCJLS. All Proceeds from the sale of said animal will be returned to the purchaser(s)/buyer(s).

4-H AND FFA DAIRY HEIFER REPLACEMENT RULES

The objective of this sale is to provide an outlet for quality dairy replacement heifers raised by 4-H & FFA youth enrolled in this project. These heifers were purchased as calves from local dairymen. Youth have raised these heifers for one or two years with each animal vaccinated, dewormed, dehorned and bred to quality sires.

GENERAL RULES

1. All dairy heifers will be pregnancy checked by a licensed veterinarian, must be at least 90 days pregnant at fair time, ear tattoo confirmed, and weighed on Tuesday, of fair week, prior to steer weigh-in at the beef scale by designated weigh master at Malheur County Fair. Health forms & E-slip needs to be turned in at weigh in. Heifer weights will be available during the sale.
2. Any heifer calving early still must be sold in the sale with the new calf considered separate from the heifer and owned by the 4-H/FFA student currently raising the animal.
3. The champion heifer of each breed will sell first.
4. The sales commission will be deducted from each check to cover expenses.
5. All money collected through the Junior Sale will be handled by the Junior Sale Committee and Nichols Accounting Services.
6. Dairy Cattle will not be pregnancy checked on the scales.
7. Contact the Dairy Replacement Heifer Program Committee for additional guidelines and rules.

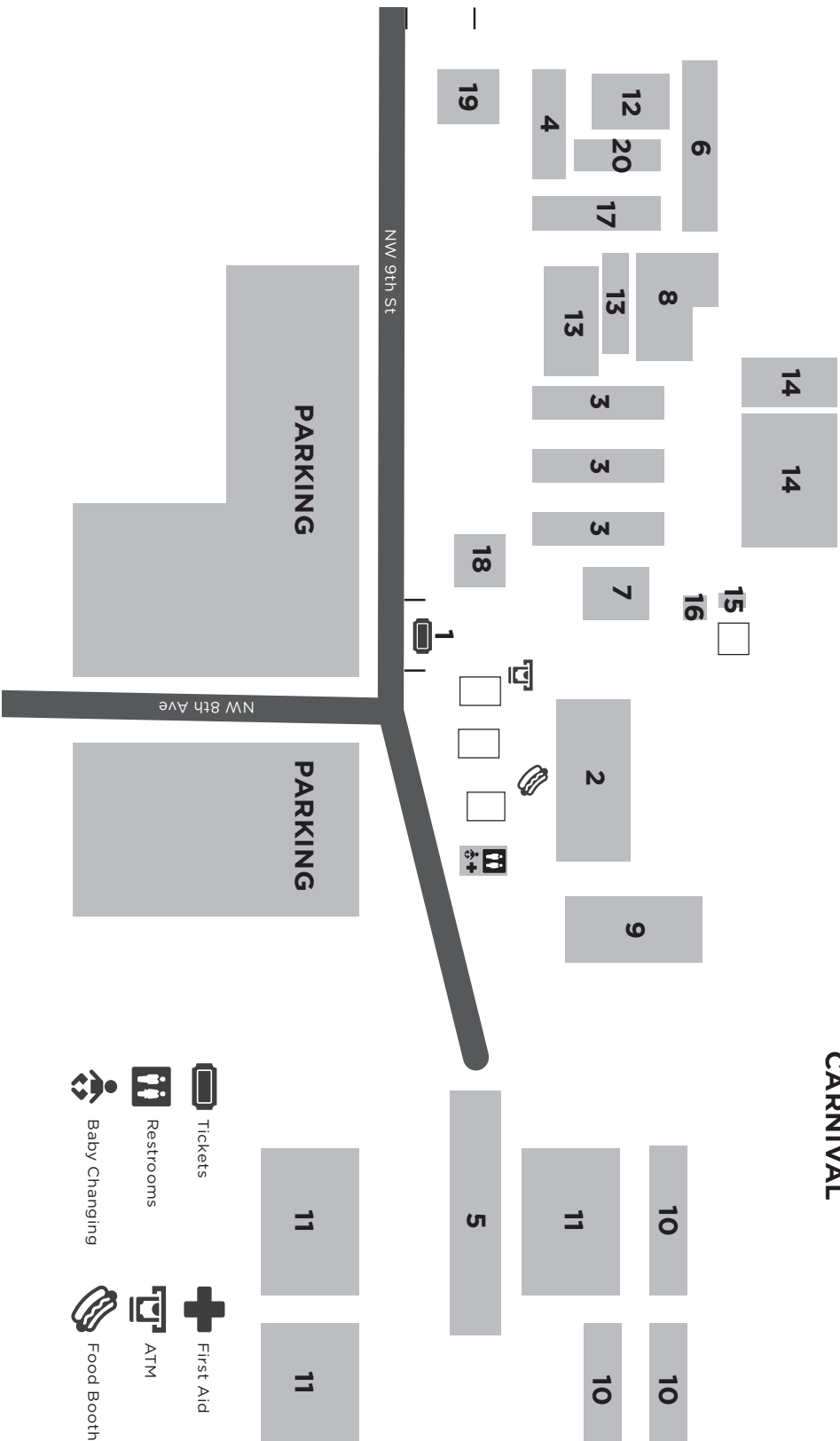

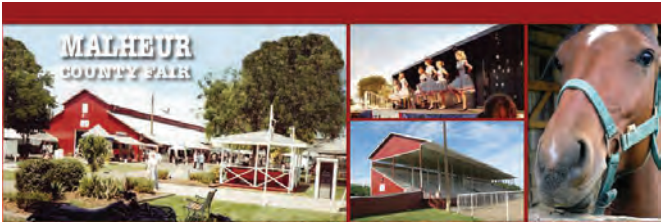

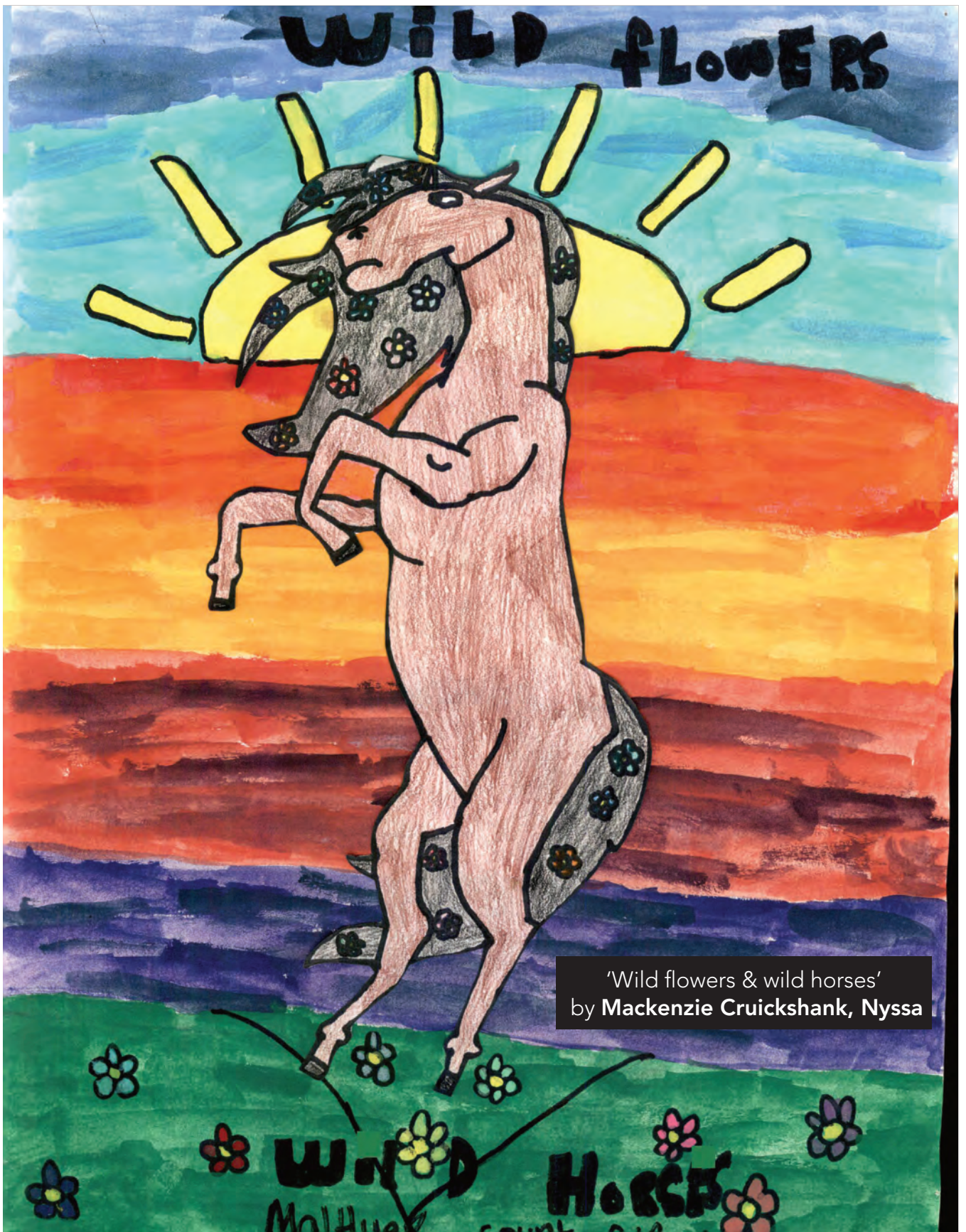

Anthony Memorial

The family started this memorial as a tribute to a father and mother who lived for the fair and loved having opportunities for their children to be involved in youth activities. They loved people and animals and the atmosphere at the county fair. This memorial honors their energies toward those ends.

Bob Bain Memorial

The son of former Malheur County Livestock Extension Agent, George Bain, Bob is remembered for his involvement in 4-H showing quality Herefords. He was killed in an accident at a very young age.

Irene Barton Memorial

Irene Barton was a mother of four and owned the Vale Shoe Shop along with her husband, Leroy. She was involved with her church ladies group and enjoyed traveling. Irene was an active 4-H supporter and co-superintendent in the food division of the Malheur County Fair for many years.

Lorraine Boor Memorial

Lorraine moved to Ontario with her parents and brother in 1930. Several years after graduating from Ontario High School she married Bill Boor. Lorraine was a dedicated wife, mom and homemaker. As a senior citizen she enjoyed entering items in several different classes at the fair. Her favorite was the sourdough class in the food division. Her hope was that her participation through the years would encourage others to enter items in the fair. Lorraine last entered exhibits at the fair at age 86 and came home with many ribbons.

Maag Brother's Beef Arena

The Maag Brothers-Emil, Warner and Benny- moved to Malheur County

in 1938 and settled in the Jamieson area where their descendants are still involved in farming and the cattle industry. The Maag Brothers were proud supporters of the fair and the fat stock sale for decades. Their hope was that the beef arena would help local youth to develop and show premium livestock. These young people are the future of agriculture and are our ambassadors.

Nancy Bracht Memorial

Nancy Bracht began quilting after her retirement in 1995. She loved to hand and machine piece quilt tops, but her greatest love was handquilting. She finished between three and four quilts every year, most of them handquilted. She was a member of the Treasure Valley Quiltmakers and won many awards throughout the valley for her beautiful handquilting.

Debbie Edmonson Memorial

Debbie grew up in Ontario and is remembered for her involvement in the 4-H program especially showing quality Angus cattle. She died very young in an accident.

Kara Hawkins Memorial

This memorial honors Kara Hawkins, a Vale resident, who fought a courageous battle with cancer during her middle school years. She loved showing Angus cattle and attending the county fair. This hard luck trophy was established to help other youth be strong throughout the unexpected potholes in life.

Lewis and Roselind Johnson Memorial

Lewis and Roselind Johnson came to the Treasure Valley in the early 1940s establishing the Lew-Rose Dairy near Vale. They owned and operated a Jersey dairy with an outstanding line of Jersey

cattle. In addition, they were known for their involvement in the beef cattle industry. Their children were all raised and educated in Vale. Many of them continue to live here, contributing to their community as Lew and Roselind did.

Linda Leininger Memorial

Growing up in the Malheur County 4-H program, Linda gave back to hundreds of youth through her loving ways as a teacher and as a 4-H horse leader. Taken by cancer at an early age, Linda will always be remembered for her positive nature and can-do attitude.

Mandy Palmer Memorial

Mandy Palmer was a 10-year 4-H member and active Ontario FFA member. She is best remembered for her love of dairy animals, her quiet manner and generous nature. She died as a result of an accident near Ontario.

Leonard F. Sherman DVM Memorial

Dr. Sherman was the Malheur County Fair veterinarian for many years, dedicating hundreds of hours to keeping the livestock and horse exhibits healthy. He helped establish the pet show to encourage more children to participate in fair activities. He also helped develop the Bid/Price calculator used for the Junior Livestock auction to help buyers. His family members continue to be actively involved in many fair activities.

Ryan Singleton Memorial

Ryan was an active teenager at the time of his death. He was a member of the Willowcreek Livestock 4-H Club enjoying showing and selling market lambs. He is remembered for loving competition, whether in a game or in the show ring.

Gilbert and Nellie Sproul Memorial

This award honors top dairymen from the Ontario area. Gilbert had quality Guernsey cattle and was known across the region for his superior cattle. He was very involved with the 4-H program and assisted many youth with their dairy projects.

The Will Tiffany Arena

Will served on the Fair Board for 20 years, and counted the construction of the Rodeo Arena as his proudest accomplishment. Where once was an obsolete race track, now thousands of people annually enjoy arena events. After his passing in 2021, the area was renamed in his honor.

Mike Clark

My fair memories with Mike Clark go back to some of the original Cactus Riders. Fair is a lot different today. Everyone shows up with regular trailers to resorts on wheels for the fair to stay the week and take in all the activities. Mike and I had a great but different experience. We along with others had to always complete morning chores on the farm, we then rode our horses to town, showed, and completed our competitions. When we were done we rode home, cows had to be milked and animals needed feed. We always enjoyed fair as it gave us a little break from the daytime chores. There are lots of other great memories with the Cactus Riders that include pony play days and trail rides.

Dan Tschida

Dan served many years as a Malheur County 4-H Livestock Club Leader. He assisted at the fair a "Beef Ring Man," helping the beef kids in the show ring, which he looked forward to and loved doing. Dan sat on the Fat Stock Sale Committee for the Malheur County Fair for over 20 years. We thank him for his service and commitment to the 4-H and FFA communities.
